

THE SITTING CONTINUES

And the Stream of Excessively Taxed Property Owners is as Large as Ever.

THE PROTESTANTS LAST NIGHT

Qualified of Railway Corporations, Banking Institutions, Insurance Corporations and Bequests.

The City Board of Equalization was again in session last night. Owing to the absence of Mayor Scott, councilman Anderson was retained as presiding officer of the evening.

The following business was transacted: A. M. Woolley complained of the excessive valuation placed on his property, and asked a reduction.

M. A. Case filed a similar complaint and asked a reduction.

H. L. Lyon asked for an effect on account of heavy indebtedness.

J. H. Herron, whose property is assessed at \$12,400, stated that it had been sold for some time just for less money.

E. M. Friedman protested against the valuation of his property on the ground that it was excessive and for its value of the county assessment.

E. H. Brooks represented that his property was assessed at \$38,500 by the city, while the county valuation of the same property was \$18,000, and that amount was excessive.

Rose Wightman said she could not pay property tax as much as she was assessed. She stated that she had paid \$100 in taxes for the year.

E. D. H. Thompson objected as follows: The property which is subject to pay taxes is valued by Mr. Case at \$125,000, it is traversed and cut up by railways and galleries to that extent that it is not a square foot of good ground in the entire tract. It was located by government survey and shall appear on the plat for the year 1901.

I will cheerfully sell the entire piece to your assessor or any member of the board of Equalization for \$500.

A. A. Smith and J. H. Brown, who are the owners of the property, stated that they would sell the property for \$500.

Another piece of property owned by Mr. Case was valued at \$200,000 by the city assessor, while the county valuation was \$100,000.
