Eagle County, Colo., is now threatened with the Sheep Troubles.

A BRAKEMAN CRUSHED TO DEATH.

Another Victim to Falling with a Loaded Rail--A Boy's Sad Death.

The sum of \$2,000 was paid for losses on wild animals last year by Larimer County, Colorado.

Al Karr, employed in the Union Pacific Railroad shops at Cheyenne, Wyo., lost three fingers while working at a nail on Saturday afternoon.

A Golden, Colo., citizen named Thomas Ward has suddenly disappeared, and it is thought he committed suicide.

The crop of strawberries in and around Boulder, Colo., is said to be double what it was last season, and prices are higher than them.

John Lichten, businessman, was spaded between two cars while working at the week-end Marshall pass, Colo., on Sunday morning. It is reported that his injuries may prove fatal.

The eight-year-old son of John Wadell was accidentally shot by a gun in his father's possession at Louisville, Ky. The boy was fooling with a rifle when it was discharged, the bullet striking his brother in the hip and making a hole through the right breast of the unfortunate youth.

Anas C. Heister Jr., one of the proprietors of the San Francisco Express, has been accidentally killed in the express room. Colleagues say he had a unique and well-standing record as a member of the firm, which was recently dissolved, the boy entering the right breast of the unfortunate man.

Thousands of acres of land are in the market at low figures, and abundant irrigation facilities, and the natural composition of the soil, a great variety of pasture, fine water, horticulture is made easy in this valley by the above conditions.

William Hines, of the Northwestern, has come in from Cheyenne, says the Leader (Wyo.) Clipper. He reports the wool being up this season and says the last shipment will be made in the first of the week. About 40,000 pounds of the best quality of fine quality of wool will constitute the shipments this season. This is an increase of nearly 200,000 pounds over last year. This speaks well for our sheep interests and proves that Cheyenne is no longer disgraced over the low price of wool. They have made a good fight and will enter the fiscal year to come with some hopes of making ends meet. Mr. Hines speaks encouragingly of the present market and says that the cost of stock will be shipped this fall and that the amount of machinery and goods shipped will far exceed any little past year.

A special dispatch from Red Cliff, Colo., to the Denver News says that Eagle county is threatened with what may be a repetition of the recent Mesa County sheep trouble. The sheep were shipped to Red Cliff destined for Tennessee, but were held up at Durango and then ordered by the state veterinary surgeon, and through courtesy of Roaring Fork and Gunnison cattlemen, they were allowed to be unloaded at Durango, to be driven across country to a point in Gunnison where they have been herded on Hellgate range until it is as bare as a board, and now they are devastating the Piney, the forest cattle range in the county. Cattlemen claim that the sheepmen break the law in driving their sheep across the range, and that the sheep will not allow the sheep to remain and destroy the range. There is said to be enough good grass land at Tennessee pass in feed 6,000 sheep through the season, and it is assumed that, the range being as good as another for sheep, the sheepmen will go to the other ranges that are the life of the stock-growing industry. A deputy sheriff has gone over to Piney range to endeavor to prevail on the sheepmen to move and avoid trouble.
