

## TO DECIDE FATE OF HIGHLAND BOY

Proposition Submitted by Farmers is Wired to New York For Decision.

LARGE BONUS IS DEMANDED.

It will be in Consideration for Permission to Operate Another Year On Present Site.

Early next week the matter of whether or not the Highland Boy smelter in Salt Lake valley will run for another year, will probably be settled. A conference was held late yesterday afternoon between the executive committee of the alliance of valley farmers and the smelter owners, represented by Mr. Waldemar Van Cott and J. E. Burke, local manager. The committee submitted a proposition, in accordance with the authority vested in them by the mass meeting of Wednesday afternoon, which passed a resolution allowing them to make terms.

The company officials were in session there Friday considering the matter of a dividend, and on account of the prospective expenditure of \$1,500,000 in building operations and a decreased output, it was considered probable that the smelters dividend would be passed. The cash bonus asked has been considered generally to be \$200,000, although officials of the farmers and the smelters refuse to confirm the general belief that this is the amount demanded.

#### FIFTEENTH ARRIVES.

Transport Sherman Lands Infantry Company at San Francisco.

The Fifteenth U. S. Infantry is in San Francisco. According to a special dispatch, the transport Sherman arrived Friday morning, 29 days from Manila, via Honolulu, seven days after an uneventful trip. She brings the Fifteenth United States Infantry, under orders to take station at Fort Douglas, Utah. Capt. Brugnone of the Sherman reports the only incident of the voyage was the gallant rescue in the harbor of Nagasaki of Private Michael McBoyle by a sailor, William Olson, who jumped overboard and held up the drowning soldier until both were picked up by a boat crew from the transport.
