TO MACADAMIZE STREETS.

Board of Public Works Asks for Authority to Make Improvements.

It was not until the 10th day of June of the following year that she and her husband began their journey across the plains with an ox team. They arrived in Sail Lake City Oct. 2, of that same year. On the 27th of that month, while still living in the wagon with which the couple crossed the plains, gave birth to her first son. With she With he husband she settled in the Sixteenth ward, Salt Lake City, where she con-tinued to reside until the day of her death, with the exception of the period spent in the country south-ward at the time Johnston's army passed through the deserted city. With other early settlers in the new country she shared in the trials and hardtry she shared in the trans and hard-chips which were the common lot of all in those days. But she endured all the attendant difficulties with pa-tience and cheerfulness. She remained faithful to her religion to the last. She was a true and joving wife and mother, a good citizen, and a consis-tent Latter-day Saint. She was of a cheerful and hopeful disposition, and scattered subshine wherever she went. Her husband, who was an henored and estimable citizen, preceded her to the great beyond 25 years. She was the mother of 16 children, 12 of shine and the state of the shine and the shine of whom survive her; she also leaves 93 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren. One of her brothers is still living, Charles Brewerton of Payson, Utah. She is the mother of Mr. Harry B. Emery, the actor and theatrical manager, Elder George R. Emery of the presidency of the Salt Lake stake of Zion, and C. F. Emeary, sheriff of Salt Lake county.
