HUNTING WILD TURKEYS. THE REMARKABLE HUNT WHICH SPEAKER BOYER AND COL. SWEENEY HAD.

The wild-turkey shooting season is at hand, and all reports from Perry. Junista, Mifflin, and other counties where these big game birds still are abundant are to the effect that turkeys have not been more pleatiful for years. They are at this season of the year so fat from feeding on acorns and early tall mast of various kinds that they become exhausted after even short flights, and frequently are compelled to alight in places most unfortunate for them. In flying across the Junista river the other day, pear Bailey's for them. During one of their hunts they were riding on the cars near the famous Fish House, on the Juniata, in Perry County. The train was running slowly, and just then a flock of turkeys started to fly across the Juniata for the mountains of Perry County. Some of them were able to get as far as the near foothills, but one was no nearly tired out when it reached the railroad that a brakeman resched up, caught it by the leg, and bagged it. Speaker Boyer and Col. Sweeny heard of the capture and at once entered into negotiations for the purchase of the bird, which was a ten-pound gobbler. The negotiations were successful, and at the next station the gallant hunters telegraphed back to Harrisburg that they had shot a fat turkey and that there would be a feast at Jim Russ' when they got back. They hunted some more, and finding a young darkey with a live coon, they bought that. Then they telegraphed back that they had shot a coon and there would be two feasts at Jim Huss' when they got back. They hunted the rest of the day without inding any one else who had game to sell, and then they came back to Harrisburg. They were met at the train by a whole rait of statesmen. They were jubilant.




