DYSPEPSIA CURE.

Leroy Sunderland, of Quincy, Mass.,
contrived the following to the Rural
News:

In the Rural New Yorker of Oct. 21
there are "pills" and "decoctions" pre-
scribed for dyspepsia; and another writer
calls for a "remedy for liver complaint".

These articles reminded me of a story told of the celebrated English
physician, who being called upon by a
desponding dyspeptic for a "remedy
for the doctor", said, "My fee is five
guineas." That paid and I will give
a prescription that is infallible." The
dyspeptic, without hesitating a moment,
handed over the fee, when the doctor
handed back to him the following pre-
scription:

"Live on sixpence a day, and earn
it."

The writer has been "forty years in
the wilderness" of the "pestle" and
"pill-boxes," and long ago was him-
self a sufferer from dyspepsia and "liver-com-
plaint".

There is a story told of another physician
that stood in the front ranks of the
medical profession who prescribed "the
oil of an axe handle" as a "sovereign
cure" for liver complaint; this "oil" to
be squeezed out every day chopping
wood. "Chop," said the doctor, "till
you feel and see the oil dropping from
your face." While giving a course of
lectures in New York some years since
on hygiene, a German doctor told me
the following: "He was applied to a
man suffering from dyspepsia, and the
doctor who is a physician, and handing
it to the patient, said: 'There, take
that.' The sick man took the paper
and departed. In a few days he re-
turned to the doctor to pay his bill,
when the latter inquired if the "remedy"
was successful, and the patient at
once declared that the piece of paper
the doctor gave him had certainly cured
him; 'but,' said he, 'I found it a dif-
ficult job to swallow it.'

There are but few, if any, cases of
dyspepsia or liver complaints but which
are brought on by habits of living;
that is, the fault in the food, or
over to its kind and quantity.

In quantity it is out of proportion to the
amount of regular and appropriate ex-
ercise taken. I could give the cases of
hundreds like the following:

Dr. S. R. L., age sixty, of a nervous
bilious temperament for fifteen years,
had had dyspepsia, constipation and
sick headache. He abandoned the city
and took to hard work in his garden
ten years ago, and without a particle of
medicine, he has been perfectly well
ever since. I have seen the worst forms
of dyspepsia and liver complaint
cured without medicine. The proverb
says "Nature performs the cure, and
the doctor gets the credit." Live on
simple food such as boiled wheat or
 parched corn. Eat no bread except
that made of unsifted meal. In Ger-
many there is a popular method known
as the "Raisin Cure" because the diet
of the patient consists exclusively of
that fruit during the process of treat-
ment. I know a man now in good
health who has lived now ten years on
this exclusively. The true method of
cure points out what is to be done, or
left undone; it is not a "done" to be
swallowed. Undo all you have done to
get sick, and good health must follow
as the result.

To the above the editor of the *Evening
New York* adds:

There is as much dyspepsia among
hard working men or women as among
those who are supposed to do nothing.
Especially among farmers it prevails;
and it is often due to the fact that they
bolt down their food in great haste,
bolt away from the table and into the
field to work, without giving the
stomach time to assimilate and digest
the food it has received. It is one of
the most prolific causes of dyspepsia
among working men. A half or whole
hour's rest should follow the eating of a
hearty meal.

BEST ROOT SUGAR.

The production of best root sugar,
which commenced sixty years ago, in
France, has gradually extended
throughout the continent of Europe,
until now about two thousand establish-
ments are yearly in existence.
In 1870, according to Dr. V. V.
Volkner, 889,000 tons were produced. Another
authority places the amount at
900,000 tons. This is more than one-
fourth of the whole sugar crop of the
world so far as known. The manufac-
ture is gradually spreading in England and
has already become successfully estab-
lished in the United States—in Wisconsin
and California. In Illinois it is
hardly successful as yet. The Sacra-
mento (Alvarado) Company of Califor-
nia, made last year 500,000 pounds of
an absolute monopoly product and are
largely extending their enterprises. In
Wisconsin the experiment has been
equally successful. The experiments
made in Illinois a few years ago failed
more from the want of experience than
any other cause. The managers are
hopeful of finally succeeding in making
their business profitable.—*Health and
Home*.
