TEACHERS TALKED ON ATHLETICS.

Instructors at L. D. S. U. Gave Good Advice to the Students

ON PHYSICAL TRAINING.

Prof. Mills Said That "A Quitter Has No Place Either in Class or Athletic Work."

At the L. D. S. university this week, President Paul called upon the teachers of physical education to make a declaration of principles. The preface given by the president was to the effect that play and recreation are as necessary in their place as work or prayer. To the gospet of recreation he admitted himself a tardy convert especially in practise; but thoroughly believed in it. As to the dancing matinees, it was explained that the directer of physical culture and the instructor in dancing were to be present at all such functions and were to instruct any dancwere that appeared to need instruction as to propriety in the positions assumed on the floor, and as to grace of movement proper etiquette, etc.

SYSTEMATIC TRAINING.

Miss Bitner, representing the ladles de artment of physical education, explains hat gymnustics means systematic paysial training, that nothing short or denite graded work is of much use to thought. different sets of muscles as well as correcting such faults as stooping shoulder, hollow chests, profruding chins and hips thrown forward.

Besides being an aid to general good health, physical education nims to produce grace, an easy carriage of the body, and correct posture. Every student in school should have some time at which to exercise in the gymnusium. By acting in unison, on time, and on comband, a quick co-ordination of mind and body is brought about.

MUSCULAR AND MENTAL POWERS. instructor Milne, the director of physical culture, showed the relation between muscular and mental power, and the necessity for a correct balance between the moral, physical and mental nature. He showed that athletics does not comprise the whole of physical training, but that the regular developing work is of much greater importance, though it is seen less than the work of exhibition days. He hed that it is not victory but development that a school should seek in all its physical training and athletic work.

DON'T WANT QUITTERS.

Prof. J. M. Mills illustrated the necessity for courage and continuity in contestants for athletic honors. "A quitter has no place either in class-work or in athletic work." In the best schools it is only those who are doing honest work as students who are permitted to engage in field contests or track meets. This is the stand taken by educators generally, and is the one which we propose to follow. VALUE OF DEEP BREATHING.

Dr. J. T. Miller spoke of the results of the physical measurements of students, particularly commenting upon the variable lung power as shown by the chest expansion of which those whom he has measured were capable. He advised all the students to practise deep breathing exercises, so as to cultivate lung power and endurance. He also recommended deep breathing as a cure for catarrh and as a prevention against ratching cold.

GALLERIES CLEARED. Stormy Scene in the Lower House

Of the Reichsrath.

Vienna. Sept. 29.—There was a stormy meeting today of the lower house of the reichsrath, which is discussing the government's declaration of policy, the people in the galieries taking part in the uproar. Eventually the session was suspended until the galieries were cleared. The premier explained his declaration regarding the revision of the basis laws of 1867. He said the revision could only relate to the treatment of the joint affairs of two halves of the monarchy, which relate to the treatment of the joint affairs of two haives of the monarchy, which from time to time must be regulated according to analogous expression.

The premier expressed the conviction that a new form of co-existence between the two haives of the monarchy would eventually be found on the condition that both countries should retain the rights guaranteed by the laws and full liberty of decision. He did not doubt that the legitifmate halves of the monarchy would be safeguarded in such a manner that not only the two states but also the monarchy as a whole would benefit. During the session there were frequent conflicts between the Socialists and anti-Semities, which led to disturbances and the clearing of the galleries.
