Allen, of Lycomenormous crystals, and the prodigious ndividuals of apatite, beryl and other minerals found have been the subject of wonderment. But for size, the crystals of sponumsne exposed in the excavations upon the Etna tin mine, in Pennington County, Dakota, carry off the palm. Professor Blake, reporting on the subject, is authority for the statement that one of these crystals is thirty-six feet in length in a straight line and feur one to three feet in line, and from one to three feet in thickness. The cleavage is smooth and straight, but the lateral and terminai planes are obscure. Crystals from five to twenty feet long are numerous, and recline in all direc-
