

ELECTIONS IN ENGLAND.

Thus Far the Unionists Gain Three Seats and the Liberals One.

R. Garton After John Burns' Seat—A Run Time in Battersea Watch—ing Manchester Closely.

London, Oct. 2.—The election in Gaiway City yesterday resulted in another conservative gain. The Hon. Martin Sturtis polled 531 votes against 70 votes polled by E. Lemmy, nationalist.

The unionist gains thus far, therefore, are three seats and the liberals gain one seat.

The total returns of the opposed and unopposed candidates up to 2 o'clock this afternoon foot up 173, comprising conservatives, 18; unionists, 25; liberals, 16; nationalists, 14.

The members elected include Sir Matthew White Ridley, the secretary of state for home affairs, (Blackpool division of Lancashire); Victor Wm. Cavendish, heir presumptive of the duke of Devonshire (West division of Derbyshire); Liberal unionist, Charles K. D. Tanner, a whip of the Irish party (Middle division of Cork) and Patrick O'Brien, also a whip of the Irish party (Kilkenny City).

The interest today centers in the Battersea division of London, from which seat R. Garton, conservative, is trying to oust John Burns, labor leader and socialist. The fight in this district is the stiffest in London and a great deal of ill feeling has been in evidence between the contending factions throughout the campaign. There has been excitement in the constituency since daybreak today and large drafts of extra police have been sent to Battersea in order to maintain peace and see that both candidates get fair play.

The conservatives count on enough liberal acquiescence, being to Mr. Burns' extreme views on the subject of war, to enable them to reverse the verdict of 1895, when Mr. Burns polled 5,919 votes, to 4,768 for Ridley Smith, conservative.

In the provinces, Manchester attracts the most attention. Apart from the fact that A. J. Balfour, the government leader in the house of commons, is the first lord of the treasury, is a candidate for re-election in East Manchester, there is much faith in the old proverb, "What Lancashire says today the rest of England will say tomorrow."

DICKENS' "NO THOROUGHFARE."

It is a fact worthy of notice that he played the same part on the occasion of Charles Fechter's production of the play in New York City a quarter of a century ago. The support of the two stars will be every respect a capable one fully equal to the requirements of Dickens & Collins' great play.

THE SUGAR PLANTS.

Springville Starts Today and Bingham Junction on the 10th.

Manager Cutler of the Utah Sugar company ran up to the city on Monday evening. He reports that everything is running smoothly at Lehi, about 1,000 bags of sugar being turned out daily. The plant at Springville was to start up today, and the one at Bingham Junction on the 10th. There had been some complication concerning the water supply for the latter plant, but all difficulties were now removed and the plant will be running by the date named. The output of sugar will then be materially increased.

Messrs. W. E. McCormick and Heber J. Grant of the executive committee of the Sugar company, spent Monday looking through the Lehi plant; they say the changes wrought are simply marvellous, and are enthusiastic over the condition of the factory in general.

He was well supported throughout, and his co-star, Mr. Stockwell, had a hearty reception. His part was but a small one, but it relieved the gloom of the story amazingly, when he was on the stage. Mr. Clement showed decided improvement since her last appearance here; both in the curtain raiser, and in the humorous part of the servant girl, she was excellent. Tonight "The Magistrate," Pinero's famous comedy rendered here with success some years ago by the Home Dramatic Club, will be presented. "The Magistrate" will be repeated tomorrow afternoon. Tomorrow evening will be seen "The Great Obstacle," which is a dramatization of Dickens' "No Thoroughfare."

At the Grand, the week opened auspiciously with quite a good turnout, though the house was not crowded. The bill for the week is "Brown's Light Town," a bright comedy, with a light and merry motive, which was done here some time ago, and then made a pleasant success. The company rendering it
