The total returns of the opposed and unepposed candidates up to 2 o'clock this aftermoon foot up 173, comprising conservatives iss; unionists, 25; liberals, 16; nationalists, 14;

The members elected include Sir Marthaw White Ridley, the secretary of state for home affairs, (Blackpool division of Lancaster); Victor Wm. Cavendish, helr presumptive of the duke of Devenshire (West division of Derbyshire); liberal unionist, Charles K. D. Tanner, a whip of the Irish party (Middle division of Cork) and Patrick O'Brien, also a whip of the Irish party Kilkenny City).

The interest today centers in the Battersea division of London, from which seat R. Garton, conservative, is trying to oust John Burns, labor leader and socialist. The fight in this district is the stiffest in London and a great deal of ill feeling has been in evidence between the contending factions throughout the campaign. There has been excitement in the constituency since daybreak today and large drafts of extra police have been sent to Battersea in order to maintain peace and see that both candidates got fair play. The conservatives count on enough liberal secessions, owing to Mr. Burns' extreme views on the subject of war, to enable them to reverse the verdict of 1895, when Mr. Burns polled 5.019 votes, to 4.766 for Ridley Smith, con-

servative.
In the provinces, Manchester attracts the most attention. Apart from the fact that A. J. Balfour, the government leader in the house of commons and first lord of the treasury, is a candidate for re-election in East Manchester, there is much faith in the old proverb, "What Lancashire says today the rest of England will say tomorrow."


