#### STORM IS DREADED.

Meanwhile the smelters were active, specially the Highland Boy, with an firention calculated to negative the pison of the smoke. The chemistry of the case was that the sulphur gas, which about 300,000 pounds is given out a day, remains harmless while dry, but s converted into sulphurous acid when lampened. Hence a severe storm is nost severe in its damage, and summer rain that was once looked on the farmer as a promise of abunfant crops, and a blessing from the ekles, is now looked upon as a plague from the powers of destruction

Once there was a smelter smoke zone. This was when the smokestacks were ow, and not so numerous as now. Two years ago the area spread over the estern half of the valley, and since then the great white smoke streaks that ascend from the stacks have awalted the call of any rainy wind to go forth on their mission of blight and destrucon. The direction was never certain, and thas year it has taken a path far tartward from any yet before trav-eled, and has carried blight in a new directio

## ARSENICAL DUST DEPOSIT.

The sulphur gas is not the only source of damage. The farmers brought in to the health authorities the skull of a sheep the teeth of which were covered with a coating of lead, Copper and lead dust pours out on the surrounding farms, but it falls before the distant areas are reached, and worse than this there are about three tons of arsenic deposited in fine dust over the valley, every day. A few grains of this is mough to prove fatal, and from a bandful of dust collected from a barn tafter several miles from the smelters, chemists last year found enough arsethe to kill several people. Herses drink-ing in pools where the deadly sulphurous gas has been disolved, have died in lage numbers in the valley, while peo-ple have found their crops of berries and fruit a source of danger too great to allow its use.

#### SLOW TO ACT.

Realizing the great good to the com-monwealth of the money brought in by the smelters Salt Lakers have been very slow to join their rural neighbors In an aggressive fight to force the expenditure of enough money by the smelters, to take care of their smoke. The money thus expended doesn't increase dividends, and managers have been very slow to undertake it. and court objections from boards of direct tors in tors in the east, who are interested only in the dividend end of the busi-ters. Newspapers which have printed the story of the loss in vegetation out in the valley have been roundly scored as enemies of the community, and as desiring the death of one of the greatistries of the state.

## WISCONSIN ELECTION RESULTS.

Cary, Republican, of Milwaukee, defeated Representative Theobald Otjem for nomination in the Fourth district.

Wm. H. Stafford, Republican in the Fifth district, was re-nominated in a close contest. Representative J. W. Babcock and Judge D. O. Mahoney are running a close race in the third dis-trict with the result still in doubt. The same conditions exist in the ninth district, where Representative Edward S. Miner and Gustav Kustermann appear to be running about even.
