LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Home Again.—Mr. Thomas R. Hays, a gentleman well known to the community, especially as a correspondent to the News and Herald, is in town and paid us a pleasant visit this morning.

Mining Reporter.—The first number of this journal was laid upon our desk today. It is a clearly printed, nice looking little sheet, and will be published every Monday by James F. Beasley, of this city.

Ladies Conference.—A misundestanding having occurred from two different announcements being made of the Ladies' Conference, we are requested to state that the conference will be held, as announced in the News and the Evening News, some time ago, on Friday and Saturday next, the 19th and 20th inst., in the 14th Ward Assembly Rooms.

Overflow.—The recent cold snap has caused the waters of City Creek to freeze to such extent that the channel on North Temple Street, just below Armstrong's mill, is almost completely choked by the accumulation of ice. Yesterday it formed a dam that caused the water to pour over into the road, a portion of the floor inundating the front end of Mr. H. K. Whitney's residence on that street.

"Grand Duchess."—Rehearsals for the juvenile opera of the "Grand Duchess" are progressing very favorably. The music of the band, solos and choruses, is delightful, and will be rendered by the best talent in the city. It is the intention of Professor Smyth, at his matinee on Saturday the 20th prox., to make a liberal reduction in the prices of admission, for day and Sabbath schools.

Dust to Dust.—The remains of Miss Nellie Ekelund, the victim of the recent gas poisoning, after funeral services at the Sexton's office yesterday afternoon at half past 3 o'clock, were conveyed to the cemetery and consigned to their last resting place. The mother and brother of the deceased were present, having arrived at 3 o'clock, from Grantsville, to attend the funeral.

"Watchman" Writings.—The following are gleaned from the Beaver Watchman of the 10th inst.: The Laundry Furnace will be sold at Sheriff's sale at the Beaver Court House on the 20th inst. Sugar is scarce in Beaver. In the corner of the crystallized article, sugar has been found useful. The prosecutions in the 2d District are being conducted by Mr. J. H. Allen, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney.

"That Puzzle Again."—The puzzle is a malady which seems to attack old and young alike, sparing neither sex, race nor condition. The other evening, or rather morning, for it was an hour past midnight, a young lady of this city returning from a party, was surprised to find a light burning in the room of her aunt, a lady who for twenty years had never known what it was to be out of bed after 9 p.m. Thinking something terrible had happened in her absence, the young girl, with a gasp, rushed in, and found that the light was from a candle, and that the old lady, who had been sitting up, was now fast asleep.

"Woman's Exponent."—The March 15th number of the Woman's Exponent contains an excellent variety of good reading matter, and will be perused with pleasure by all who claim a vote. The Women of Utah, a poem by Emily H. Woodmansee, is the opening piece, followed by an attractive essay from the pen of Blanche Beesley, entitled "Whitby People." "A Contented Wife," by H. M. W., is also an interesting prose article. The editorial is "What is Happiness," and then follows "The Dignity of Self Control," by Lulu; "Conversation," (continued), by the able writer Hannah T. King; "Woman's Rights and Mission," by M. E. Little, and "Woman," by M. E. Kinball. The Woman's Question is also treated by "Dorcas," and Harriet Walker. "Not Dead but Sleeping" is the title of another article on the same subject, by L. E. D. These, with a poem by G. A. Karkick, and other shorter sketches make the present issue of the woman's paper, a very interesting number.

Fatal Accident.—A lamentable accident happened last evening over on the West Jordan range, by which a young man named John Avery, of the 15th Ward, a son of Brother Evan Avery, met a sudden and violent death. In company with a young lad, named Thomas Barry, aged about 16 years, he was out hunting. A flock of ducks passed over their heads about dusk, and the two young men, in order to get out of sight, dropped upon their knees in a sort of pit, thinking the birds might come over them and thus give them one more shot. Avery, seeing the flock approach, began getting his gun into position. The weapon, a double-barreled shotgun, was lying on the ground with the muzzle pointing directly at him, and in this position he drew it up towards his body. It is presumed that the gun was already cocked, as hunters frequently carry their weapons in that way, so as to be prepared to shoot on the instant, and that the trigger caught a slight rock, or something else, which caused the discharge of one of the barrels. The load struck Avery in the face, just to the right of the nostril, inflicting a ghastly wound, and lodged in the brain. He never spoke nor made a move after falling. After satisfying himself that his companion was dead, young Barry ran to a neighboring house, to procure help. The owner of the dwelling, Mr. Alexander, took his team and with two others brought the body of young Avery to his home in this city, arriving about 10 o'clock last night. The feelings of the parents on seeing their son brought home dead, are better subjects for thought than description. John Avery was about 25 years of age, unmarried, and was a good faithful young man. He held the office of a deacon in the Church, was sober and industrious, and was very highly esteemed by all his acquaintances. He was engaged to be married in about three weeks to a daughter of Brother Jas. Lewis, of the 15th Ward. A coroner's inquest was to be held this afternoon at 1 o'clock. The funeral will take place at the 15th Ward meeting house, to-morrow afternoon, at 1 o'clock.

The Ekelund Investigation.—The inquest upon the body of Miss Nellie Sophia Ekelund was concluded last evening. The immediate cause of the sad event had been officially determined earlier in the day, but a further investigation was held in the afternoon and at night, at which a number of gas proprietors, fitters and workmen were examined, for the purpose of deciding on whom the blame should rest for leaving the gas tube, in Mr. Lowe's house, in such a condition that the gas escaped therefrom, which caused the death of Miss Ekelund. Following is the verdict rendered at the conclusion of the investigation:

TERRITORY OF UTAH,
COUNTY OF SALT LAKE.
An inquisition, taken at the residence of George A. Lowe, Esq., in the 15th Precinct of Salt Lake City, Salt Lake County, Territory of Utah, on the 15th day of March, A.D. 1909, before George J. Taylor, coroner of said county, upon the body of Nellie Sophia Ekelund, there lying dead, by the jurors whose names are hereunto subscribed:

The said jurors, upon their oaths, do say that death was caused by asphyxiation, superinduced by the inhalation of coal gas, which escaped from a leaky tube, in her bedroom, on the night of March 11, 1909, at the new residence of George A. Lowe, Esq., and we further find that although we cannot, in justice, charge anyone with criminal negligence, still we are of the opinion that the gas-fitter is censurable for failing to trace out and remedy the leak after having been duly notified thereof by the superintendent of the gas company, and also by the firm of Heech & Ellerbeck.

In testimony whereof, the said jurors have hereunto set their hands and seals, and year first above written.

Seeing the Sights.—Notwithstanding the limited time at the disposal of the De Lesseps party, while in this city yesterday afternoon, the distinguished visitors found opportunity to visit many points of interest within the corporate limits, among which were the Deseret University, Z. C. M. I., Deseret Museum, Seventeenth District school and other places. The Count and his friends also called on President Taylor at his office and spent half an hour very pleasantly there in the early part of the afternoon.

A circumstance that seemed to afford them considerable gratification was that President Taylor conversed with them in the French tongue, a language which he speaks quite readily. The party, as stated yesterday, took the 3:40 p.m. train for Ogden and thence departed for San Francisco. They will spend but three or four days there, on business, and then return to New York, from which port they will embark in time to arrive in Paris by the 15th proximo.

Sentenced to Three Years.—James F. Graham, of Ogden, who was indicted several months ago for embezzlement, while in the employment of the Central Pacific Railroad Company, and who has since been tried in the Third District Court and found guilty of the charge contained in the indictment, was sentenced yesterday, by Chief Justice Hunter, to a term of three years in the Utah Penitentiary.
