### RESERVOIR PROPOSITION.

Assuming Definite Shape—Committee on Permanent Organization Selected.

### Real Estate School Will Open Sept. 4.

After Witnesses for Major's Trial—Court Notes.

### A meeting was held in the Weber

State academy yesterday morning at which Pres. L. W. Shurtliff was chairman and Mr. Harris, of Harrisville, secretary, between the Utah Light and Power company and the various water companies of Weber county, to further consider the proposition of erecting a large dam in Ogden canyon, referred to in the "News" some days ago. The meeting between the Power company and the farmers was quite satisfactory, and it was decided to appoint a committee on permanent organization to draft articles of incorporation. Two were selected from the Power company and three from the farmers, as follows: Bishop John H. Winder and R. S. Campbell of the Power company, and Nathaniel Montgomery, of Pleasant View, Bishop Geo. Bramwell, of Plain City, and Geo. Hunter, of Weber City. This committee will meet next Saturday at the Weber State academy at eleven a. m. The Weber county are watching the actions of the various committees with interest, believing that this storage dam, which will be built so that next season their crops will not burn up with the drought.

### DEAF MUTE SCHOOL.

The State School for the deaf and blind will open for the school year, 1901-2, on Wednesday, September 4th. Pres. Briggs states that there will be at least 15 new pupils from Utah this year, and that most of the pupils from Idaho will go to the Colorado institution this year, so that the total attendance at the Utah school will be about the same as last year.

### AFTER MAJOR WITNESSES.

Shirley Gordon of Brigham City was in Ogden today subpoenaing witnesses for the case of the State of Utah vs. Major, who was to be given a new trial for the killing of Captain William Brown of the Ogden police force one year ago last May.

#### REMAINS TAKEN TO DENVER.

The remains of C. E. Kracaw, who committed suicide in Spanish Fork Monday, were taken to Denver this morning by his wife.

A few errors appeared in the report published in the "News" of Mr. Kracaw's employment in Provo and boarded at Mrs. S. S. Jones, where his wife commuted.

Sunday morning, Mr. Jones did not go to Payson, but the father of the young lady, who had gone to Payson with Mr. Kracaw in deciding his wife and daughter back to Provo. After that Mr. Kracaw went to Spanish Fork and wrote to his wife Monday, and a telephone message from the hotel at Spanish Fork to Mr. Jones announcing that Mr. Kracaw had taken poison. Mr. Kracaw went immediately to him, after directing over the phone through Mr. Jones that everything possible be done to save her husband. She was driven the distance, 12 miles, by Mr. S. J. Jones in 40 minutes. Kracaw told the people in Spanish Fork that he had taken laudanum with suicidal intent. It is supposed that he felt ashamed of his course in deciding his wife and daughter to die. He concluded to end his trouble by death. Much sympathy is felt for Mrs. Kracaw, who appears to be a refined and intelligent lady.

#### THE BECK JEWELRY BURGLARY.

Further investigation brings the loss sustained by Mr. Beck, through the robbery of his safe Tuesday morning, above \$100.
