It seems from the facts of the case that Congress made an original grant of a right of way over the ridge for a width of four hundred feet, to the Ulah Central Railway, the original company operating what is now the Oregon Short Line railway between the cities of Ogden and Salt Lake. The defendants now have the actual possession, and their predecessors in interest had the actual possession of land, the boundary line of which extended along the land originally granted by Congress to the railway as a right of way; and it is claimed by the defensa that the railway lost whatever right it ever had to the land in question by and through the adverse possession of the defendants. The rallway company laims that the rallway corporation beig a quasi-public corporation because of the public duties devolving upon it as such, can not lose any rights it may have acquired to the land by the original grant; that the statutes of limitations would not run against the company because of its franchise. question teems to be: "Can a right of way granted from the public domain by an act of Congress be lost to the Rail-way company to which the grant was nade Letauss of the adverse possession of a prel'emptor, or a homesteader? of water for irrigation purposes during the past two or three years in the northern end of Utah county has been quite a serious subject for discussion among the farmers of this locality, and o-meet the difficulty a committee from Lehi has already investigated the practicability of bringing the headwaters of the Duchesne river and Strawberry creek over the divide into Daniel's creek which would then flow into the Prove river and could be taken out at the mouth of Provo canyon across Provo bench to Pleasant Grove, American Fork and Lehi. The committee say that this can be easily accomplished without any physical obstacles or any

legal complications. Meetings are being held in Lehi, American Fork and Pleasant Grove to consider the feasibility of the project, and judging from the ex-pressions of those interested in it something will be done at once to furnish more abundant supply of water for rrigation purposes. Other experiments are also being

made in regard to increasing the supply of water by surface wells being dug and the water being pumped electric power. There are already quite a number of these motor pumps now being utilized in Lehi with fine success at a very nominal cost. If these schemes can be effected and the requisite amount of water needed for irrigation purposes secured, that feeling of re
