

ADAMS PLANNED WHOLESALE MURDER

Says He Was Sent to Pocatello To Intercept Carload of Non-Union Men.

WAS TO HAVE BURNED CAR.

Material Was "Pettibone Dope" and He Has Been Taken to Pocatello To Find It.

Pocatello, March 27.—Steve Adams, one of the men who confessed regarding their connection with crimes in Colorado, and in this state, charged against the so-called inner circle of the Western Federation of Miners, was taken to Pocatello today to dig up a lot of material designated as Greek fire, which he claims to have buried there late in the summer of 1901.

Detective McFarland, Detective Thiele and Gov. Gooding were in the party, also Warden Whitney of the penitentiary, and Traveling Guard Robbins and two newspaper men.

Adams, in his confession, stated he was sent by Haywood and Meyer to Pocatello to intercept a carload of non-union men being sent from the Cour d'Alene to Colorado.

He was directed to kill the entire lot and expected to do so with the Greek fire. This was to be thrown into the car as it was in the station. These breakers would immediately envelope everything with fire that nothing would be left standing. He had two quart bottles and three small ones.

The car of non-union men did not come through, as expected, and after waiting a good while the plan was given up. Adams then buried the stuff in a trench which had been used as a sawmill, packing the bottles in a tin can. He was certain he could go to the spot and unearth the cache. Adams is digging up the trench to find the cache. One glass stopper has been found, which Adams thinks belongs to one of the small bottles. He says he took the stuff to Pocatello in a canvas bag and threw it into the mill when he had buried the bottles.

The owner of the building is J. C. Weller. He remembers finding the cache exactly where Adams says he buried it. Adams says he buried the stuff in a trench where a timber had been placed that had supported the roof of the mill. Persons familiar with the place say there were several of these trenches which were left open when the timbers were removed.

Adams is confident he will find the cache, as he is certain it could not have been dug up by others without having caused an accident.

McFARLAND'S STATEMENT.

Pocatello, March 27.—Following is the statement made by James McFarland, detective manager, respecting the portion of the confession of Adams relating to the alleged plan to kill a lot of non-union miners while they were passing through Pocatello.

On March 26, 1906.—On Feb. 28, while taking down the statement of Stephen W. Adams relative to the numerous outrages and murders committed at the instance of the inner circle of the executive board of the Western Federation of Miners, and while making out certain high explosives, I informed him that George A. Pettibone made an explosive known as "hell fire" or "Pettibone dope", that, in his opinion, was the most dangerous explosive that was made on account of the fact that it is certain it could not be extinguished by water. In other words, a building set on fire by this explosive would be burned to the ground regardless of efforts to put it out.

The explosive was made of stick phosphorus, bluish of carbon, alcohol, benzene and spirits of turpentine. The ingredients being properly mixed were placed in bottles with stoppers, the stoppers being properly sealed. In order to explode these bottles and start a fire you simply throw the bottle against a substance that would cause the same to explode, which would cause a frightful explosion and fire, a fire that could not be extinguished by water. non-union miners from the Cour d'Alene and other districts.

"It was at this time that Meyer approached Adams in the presence of Pettibone, the latter's store in Denver and informed him that he wanted him to meet him again at the store in the early part of the evening when he would go with him down to the Cour d'Alene. He said he wanted him to go to Pocatello, Idaho, and carry with him some 'Pettibone dope' which he was to throw into the carload of non-union miners and set the train loaded with 'scabs' and set the train on fire as it passed through Pocatello. He went on to state that according to appointment he met Meyer at Pettibone's store, where Meyer provided him with a telescope grip-sack. In this grip-sack was a tin can which, as Adams said, contained two quart bottles and three pint bottles of the 'Pettibone dope'. Meyer bought him a ticket for Pocatello and told him to get a berth in the sleeper so that he would get a good night's rest and watch every train that came through Pocatello and if he could find out the train that was loaded with 'scabs' he was to fill it full of this 'Pettibone dope' or 'hell-fire', just throw the bottles through the windows and they would explode.

"On arriving at Pocatello Adams made some inquiries relative to the supposed 'scabs' that were to pass through, but so far as he could learn there were no 'scabs' being transported through the town they were scattered in through the cars; therefore, he concluded he would not take any chances in burning up a train of innocent passengers, and did not use this dope. Having been informed through Meyer, Haywood and Pettibone that the mine owners of Cripple Creek were shipping 'scabs' through Arizona by way of Ogden, he went there and found that such was the case. Notwithstanding the fact that this 'hell-fire' or 'Pettibone dope' was securely sealed in bottles, he found that it was smelling strongly so he took the telescope containing these bottles of explosives along with him. He thought, a little distance east of Pocatello.

It was quite a little piece out of the town, something near a mile, where he

planted the bottles in a little trench in front of an old building. The building had no floor in it, and looked as though it might have been an old mill at some time. The bottles were still in the tin can when he planted them there and covered them with a little dirt. He took the telescope up and threw it back into this old building. While he remained some time in Pocatello he could not give the location of where these bottles of explosives were buried, but said that he could walk to the same if in Pocatello, and he believed that the explosives are still there because if it had ever been disturbed there would have been an explosion that would have been published in the papers. "He went to Ogden and subsequently came back to Denver and reported to Meyer and Haywood and Pettibone that it was simply impossible for him to execute the work he was detailed on without taking innocent people's lives."

JOHNSTOWN, PA., SWEEPED BY FIRE.

Johnstown, Pa., March 28.—For three hours immediately after midnight this morning, Johnstown business section was threatened with destruction by fire, which was only placed under control after it had burned itself practically out, caused a loss estimated at \$500,000 and the death of one fireman, William Campbell, who was caught under a falling wall.

At an early hour this morning it was reported that G. H. Santamoure, a telegraph operator for the Publishers' press association, was missing. Santamoure was in the office of the Johnstown Journal which was burned out, and after the fire he could not be found. It is feared he perished in the flames. The fire broke out at the corner of Main and Bedford streets, occupied by the Swank Hardware company, dealers in paints, oils and hardware. The flames quickly spread through the building, and a general alarm was sent in. Every available fireman and every piece of fire fighting apparatus was soon on the scene, but despite firemen's efforts, the fire was soon beyond control.

Adjoining buildings were soon in flames, and considerable apprehension was felt over a quantity of stored goods being reported stored in the Swank building. There was no explosion, however, although the building was entirely gutted. The flames swept on to the three-story brick building occupied by Fisher & Co., wholesale liquor, then on to the WPA building, partly consumed, the five-story brick building of the Henderson Furniture company, and then leaped to the L. A. Geis building, a four-story furniture warehouse, and the residence of L. A. Geis, where it practically burned itself out. The firemen were seriously handicapped by inadequate equipment and constantly burning hose, and for a time it was thought aid would have to be summoned from Altoona. This was not necessary, however, when the flames had swept over the five buildings, and died down in the Geis building, the firemen had the situation in hand, and it was announced that all danger of further spread of the flames was over. A partial list of the losses as far as it is possible to ascertain are approximately as follows:

Dermott & Sons, Hardware company, stock, \$40,000; in WPA building, \$25,000.
Johnstown Daily News Publishing company, in WPA building, \$25,000.
Dr. W. M. Grove, in WPA building, \$3,000.
Dr. Owen Morgan, dentist, in WPA building, \$3,000.
The losses on the 26 offices of professional men in the Swank and WPA buildings it has been thus far impossible to ascertain.

HIGGINS FOR INVESTIGATION.

Albany, N. Y., March 27.—Gov. Higgins declared last night that he was still in favor of an investigation of the state banking department, and that if the assembly should fail to pass the measure providing for an investigation the responsibility would rest with that body.

"I believe that there should be an investigation of the department," said the governor. "It is a responsibility which rests with the assembly if it fails to act. There is now before it a bill for action."

ROYAL ARCANUM AFFAIRS.

Boston, March 28.—Arguments in the case of Stephen W. Higgins and others against the supreme council of the Royal Arcanum, to set aside the new table of rates adopted in May, 1904, were concluded yesterday in the Massachusetts supreme court. The court reserved decision.

The plaintiffs charge that the adoption of the new rates was illegal because such action impaired the membership contract and changed the character of the order from a fraternal beneficiary organization to one on life insurance lines.

CLOUDS GATHER OVER RUSSIA.

Resentment Against Government's Repressive Measures Arousing the People.

WAR OFFICE UNUSUALLY BUSY

It is Dispatching Machine Guns and Ammunition in Every Direction.

St. Petersburg, March 27.—Despite the government's assurance that another extensive outbreak in the immediate future is impossible, the clouds are lowering and there are other indications that a big storm may break before parliament meets. The resentment against the terrible repressive measures of the government is arousing the people, especially the workmen in cities, to fury. This is playing into the hands of the revolutionaries, who are planning a strike and a general uprising. They believe the right moment will come in mid-April, and both sides are preparing for the fray. If it comes it is likely to be bloodier and more terrible than anything previously witnessed in this country. The record of arrests last week in St. Petersburg, besides showing an awful state of lawlessness in the capital, is eloquent testimony of the methods by which the government hopes to prevent the threatened explosion.

According to the returns 659 beggars, 215 persons without passports, 217 thieves, 570 highwaymen and 1,067 "unclassified" persons, who means political suspects, were taken into custody. At no time during the war was the war office more busy than now, making dispositions to suppress the first evidence of rebellion. Machine guns and ammunition are being dispatched in every direction, troops are being stationed at railroad centers, and old automobiles are being sent to the larger cities for use in street riots.

CHINESE REVOLUTIONISTS.

Victoria, B. C., March 27.—Advices received from China by the Express of Japan today, which are being reprinted in an anti-dynastic coup at Peking. A dispatch to the Tokio Hochi says revolutionaries are congregating caravans of arms and ammunition purchased from Belgium at Tien Tsin, which have been conveyed to Mongolia. The finding of a parcel of bombs by gendarmes at Peking depot caused consternation to the court, and forces of newly organized foreign-made Manchurian troops in Peking were ordered to surround the depot. The military police arrested several persons and Peking was for a time panic stricken.

CELEBRATED SLAVE DEAD.

East Liverpool, O., March 27.—Daniel F. Spiers, a well-known ex-slave, who purchased his freedom in 1831 for \$500, died today, aged 102 years.

WEATHER PREDICTIONS.

Chief Moore Says May Soon Be Made For a Month Ahead.

New York, March 28.—Willis L. Moore, chief of the weather bureau at Washington, announced last night at the dinner of the Marine exchange that the weather bureau might soon issue forecasts for a whole month. Mr. Moore had been joking hard by Job E. Hedges, when he arose and got permission to add to his speech, already delivered. He then said:

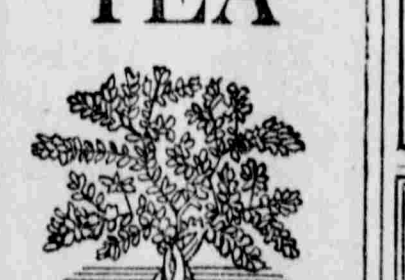
"The weather bureau believes that for the first time in the history of meteorological science it has within its grasp the scientific basis of long range weather forecasting—that is, forecasts of the character of the month to come."

"The details are not yet complete, and the system will not be adopted for some time. It may be possible, and I believe it will be, to tell you New Yorkers and members of the maritime exchange before the first of the month what the character of the coming month will be."

CHICAGO TRACTION CO.'S POLICY.

Chicago, March 28.—Practically everybody connected with the street car companies of Chicago is in New York for the purpose of studying the situation and figuring on what can be done. It is probable that a traction policy, applicable to all the lines in the city, will be adopted by the Chicago Union Traction companies will be decided upon within a week. President Thomas E. Millen and John A. Spoor, chairman of the Chicago City Railway company; General Counsel W. W. Gurley and Receiver James H. Egan of the Chicago Union Traction company, and H. A. Blair, receiver, and W. J. Calhoun, attorney for the North and West side underlying companies, are expected to be in New York within the coming week. The policy of the companies with relation to the city will be discussed and it is possible the management of affairs in Chicago for the two companies will be entrusted to Messrs. Millen and Gurley, with authority from the financial interests to negotiate with the city for a short term franchise extending to the heart of a united, continuous service between

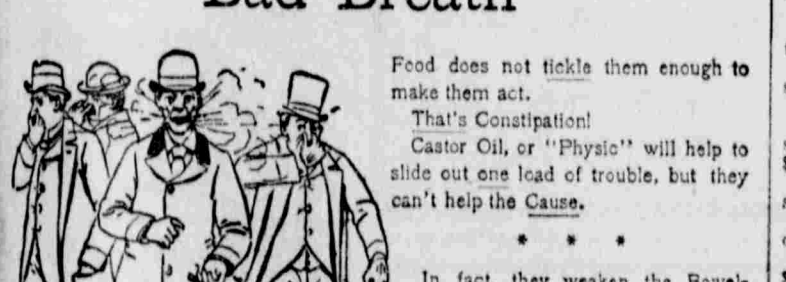
