

an abrupt termination to day. The Andrew Lee branch of the iron and steel workers having collapsed. The president of the local branch visited Philadelphia yesterday to have some of the promises of financial aid made by Jarrett's Co. fulfilled, but receiving no assurances that substantial relief would be afforded, he returned home and terminated the matter this morning. The members have decided almost unanimously to disband and ask the company to reinstate them. The committee, of which the president of the branch is spokesman, conferred with superintendent Fritz. The committee was informed by the company that the company would give employment to workmen who had gone out, but no assurance was given that all the former employees would be taken back. The delegates who attended the convention in Philadelphia returned to night.

YORK, Pa., 15.—Judge Jeremiah A. Black is suffering from urinary affection and is seriously ill, but at 11 last night was resting quietly under the influence of opiates. No immediate danger is apprehended by the physicians.

CINCINNATI, O., 15.—Jas. Mixon, of Sunlow, Ky., was working 70 men in New Cumberland Falls, Tenn., making ties for the Cincinnati Southern Railroad. On Sunday night Charles Slayed, one of Mixon's men, who slept in the same bunk with James and John Adair and a man named Osborne, arose after his companions were asleep and crushed their skulls with an axe, rifled their pockets of about \$60 and escaped. Mixon put his whole force of men in pursuit and to day Slayed was captured near this place. It is thought he will be lynched.

FOREIGN.

London, 13.—It is announced that the Queen has approved the appointment of the Duke of Connaught to be Divisional Commander in Bengal.

A dispatch dated Hanoi, August 5th, says: Six river gunboats are here, preparing temporary armor for their boilers. Everything points to a severe encounter. The French have no artillery horses or mules. The enemy is pressing closer both here and at Mamline. It is believed the Viceroy of Yun Nan is actively forwarding assistance, to the enemy. The London correspondent of the Manchester Guardian says the chief prelates of the Roman Catholic Church in Europe and America will assemble at the Vatican in November next, as the Pope wishes to consult them as to the means of maintaining friendly relations with all the powers.

Mark Lane Express, in its review of the British grain trade the past week, says grain is ripening slowly, owing to unsettled weather. Rust and mildew have increased. Wheat is losing in quantity and quality daily. Barley and oats have much improved. English wheat improved 1s. on the week. Trade in foreign wheat off stands slow. Barley steady, price unchanged. Oats 3d., dearer. Trade in wheat off coast was more active. Sales of English wheat for 20 weeks 35,131 quarters, at 43s. 6d. per quarter, against 10,10,122 quarters, at 50s. 6d. the corresponding week last year.

The commander of the British troops in Egypt telegraphs that two soldiers died at Suez yesterday. There was also a death among the troops at Ramleh.

Holmes, Boyce, Norwood, Davoy, and Grey, members of Parliament, and Lord Carrington sail Saturday next for the United States. They will be present at the ceremonies attending the opening of the Northern Pacific railway.

PARIS, 13.—The Swiss National Festival opened to-day with a procession, speeches and music.

The Emperor of Austria and King of Italy will have an interview in Hungary next month.

SAIGON, 13.—Seven hundred men have been sent to Admiral Courbet, commander of the French squadron in Tonquin.

Constantinople, 13.—It is stated that the Porte intends to transfer the negotiations in relation to the treaty of commerce with America, and the license tax from Constantinople to Washington.

MADRID, 14.—The Marquis de la Vega Arviso, when he returns to the capital from Portugal will report. He has learned full details of the plot of the revolutionary fraternity, which is composed of all grades between the ranks of sergeants and lieutenant-colonels. There were five divisions in the circle, the leaders

only knowing the centers of organization. If the movement had been successful, each of five officers in each division was to receive two steps in promotion. Officers who retired at the restoration of the monarchy took an important part in the movement. The military, it then appears, lent themselves to Zorilla's arms for purely selfish motives.

The review of the Madrid garrison to-day was without any unusual incident. The troops saluted the King as they defiled past. The King will shortly visit Barcelona, Saragossa, Valencia and other towns. He will review the garrisons of those places. A Colonel and 901 unarmed men entered France at Port Vendres. They are supposed to be fugitives from Leo D. Urgen. Many fugitive soldiers and corporals from Badajoz presented themselves to the Spanish Consul at Elvas, Portugal, to-day and asked pardon, stating they had been deceived.

LONDON, 14.—There was a great fire this morning on Orchard Wharf, Blackwell, where a large warehouse stored with jute and hemp was destroyed. There have been two fires on the same wharf since June.

The Varnish and Japan manufactory of Nobles & Howe is burning. The damage will probably be very heavy. There are 40 engines on the ground.

1 p.m.—There was almost a panic at the stock exchange here this morning in American railroad securities, which are greatly depressed, and are difficult to sell. American government bonds are not affected by the unfavorable feeling in railway securities. Mexican railway stock strong.

LONDON, 14.—Returns so far from the elections in France, show a net republican gain of 100 seats and a republican triumph, most notable in districts hitherto reactionary.

Montreal, 14.—Two hundred and fifty strikers belonging to the cigar maker's union, left for the United States, manufacturers here refusing to increase their wages.

Alexandria, 14.—There were 44 deaths from cholera here yesterday.

LONDON, 14.—The Sanitary Commission has decided to remove the cordon around Alexandria.

Deaths from cholera in Egypt Sunday, 407.

It is reported that a case of cholera has been discovered at Flushing, Holland.

The friends of Count de Chambord have abandoned all hope of his recovery.

The Pope requests Cardinal McCabe, Archbishop of Dublin, to summon a chapter of his diocese to nominate a coadjutor who shall become Archbishop.

A telegram received at Vienna reports that cholera has appeared at Soudan.

Gladstone will visit his constituents at Midlothian during the autumn recess.

In the Commons, to-night, the bankruptcy bill and national debt bill passed their third reading and tramways (Ireland) bill its second reading. The last named bill provides for a government guarantee of one million pounds for the opening up of the western district of Ireland by light steam tramways.

The House agreed to a proposal that £180,000 of the church surplus fund be applied to emigration purposes. Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, assented to the suggestion of Parnell that half the sum be devoted to emigration purposes, and promised to so amend the arrears act that the grant to emigrants should in certain cases be raised to £8.

A Times Madrid dispatch says it is certain more French notes and gold have been run into Spain recently than in any previous period. The belief is now general that funds in aid of the recent revolutionary movement were even subscribed by French Republican politicians and speculators on the Bourse.

A Madrid dispatch says the French frontier police have been reinforced. The Spanish Consul at Perpignan telegraphs that the rebel refugees will be interned beyond Laire.

The demand for Zorilla interment will be approved by the Powers, including Germany.

Only one of the revolutionary sergeants is arrested in Spain.

Commissions were found signed by Zorilla.

King Alfonso has summoned Gen. Castello from Carlsbad.

Dublin, 14.—Juror Field has sold the furniture in his house, preparatory to quitting Ireland. An abortive attempt was made to boycott the sale.

Paris, 14.—Temps says a Spanish

regiment revolted in Catalonia, and that conflicts had taken place between the insurgents and loyal troops at Leo de Urgen, Girona and Figueras.

Rear-Admiral Galiber is definitely appointed to succeed Admiral Pierre as commander of the French naval forces in Madagascar.

The Republicans now have a majority in 78 of 93 districts for the General Council. They carried even Corsica and Morbihan.

Vienna, 14.—At 4.30 p.m., a telegram just received from Frohedorf announces that the Count de Chambord is wrestling with death.

Crowds stand at the gates of Compté de Chambord's chateau at Frohedorf, awaiting the sufferer's end.

St. Petersburg, 14.—The police surprised a Nihilist meeting to-day and arrested five persons.

A dispatch says the election for the Cortes is postponed. It is asserted that the Duke de Femar Nuney, Spanish Ambassador to Paris, has formally requested if Zorilla is still permitted to continue his residence in France that he be compelled to reside in some particular specified town.

Cairo, 14.—The river Nile is falling. There are no longer fears of a flood.
