The board of directors of the Carnegie Trust company, it is understood, will hold a meeting this week and elect Mr. Shaw president of the corporation. Charles C. Mr. Shaw, it is said, has made plans to leave Washington immediately upon the adjournment of Congress, and is ex-pected at his desk in the office of the Carnegie Trust company on March 5.
