PAYSON.

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County Court.

At the session of the county court, a communication was received from the Salt Lake Chamber of commerce, calling attention to resolutions adopted by that body endorsing the policy of the state legislature in reference to the Uintah and Ouray Apache reservations thrown open for settlement. The county court favored the scheme, and adopted resolutions similar to those of the chamber of commerce, for general legislation and action for the protection of the Indians, but a very small number of Indians live on those reservations.

A resolution was adopted, relative to the removal of the Apache Indians from the Uintah Park. Of the appropriate sum is to be used for the removal of the Indians, and the remainder, and all else not used, to be expended in collecting ex parte.

The petition of residents of Uintah and Ouray asked for a change of boundary of said district, was denied.

Reports of just and fair services were received and deposited in the usual manner.

Notes.

Mrs. Noeline Minster, aged 80, wife of Captain Minster, who died a day or two ago, was born in New York, and comes to Utah three years since.

Asaph Loomis has commenced suit against the Black and Gentry W. Clark to recover \$100 damages, it being alleged that they have mislaid.

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THEY ARE SHORT-SIGHTED,

The Attempt to Raise R. H. Freight Rates Will Prove It.

It appears to a man up a tree that both the Union Pacific and Rio Grande Western are trying to kill the goose that lays the golden (or silver) egg for them; as it is understood here that rates on everything are to be raised, and that the railroads' January 1st will be much higher than at present. The roads will soon disappear that mistake, however, for Park City is not the town to be so slow on such a matter as saying something about it. It is thought that the Rio Grande will try to come to terms, but that is a matter which the future will make clearer, one way or the other.

Rates on coal under the new order of things after Jan. 1st, will increase prices to the public to a stamp to pay above one dollar per ton, and the several coal dealers are laying in a large supply in consequence.

The Week at the Park.

The week has been a very lively one at the Park and the Christmas holidays were passed very pleasantly with many entertainments, both private and public. The merchants' trade was nearly equal to that of a year ago, and they are consequently well pleased.

A great deal of snow has fallen during the week and in many places the roads are quite impassable. The mail department is still in full force, and the post office department is doing well.

Considerable snow fell this morning and the snow threatener almost fell before many hours have passed.

Oscillation.

Our shipments from the Oriental have been suspended at a time when during the week and the Utah Central has been put to the test to supply a sufficiency of coal. Both first and second class coal has been shipped, and the total for the week from the Utah Central is over 1,000 carloads. The cause of the great rush is to get all the ore possible on the Rio Grande road before that road puts on the high or other charges for hauling to Leadville.

Notes.

The Utah Central has been delayed several times during the week by snow, but usually manages to pull in and move down an hour later.

Omaha will be shipped during the week fifteen cars of coal and a large amount of merchandise.

Silver King and Amherst will keep up their regular shipments, and those last three days in line.

The Park City band boys are to give a concert on Saturday evening, Dec. 31, at the Opera house. The boys are invited to a large crowd, as they have at all times been willing to enter in every kind of entertainment.

The concert, given at the High church Tuesday night was largely attended and very much enjoyed.

All the churches gave Christmas entertainments, and all members of Sunday schools were represented by their choirs.
