POOR OLD CRADLEBAUGH.—The Reese River Reveille of the 15th instant has a leading article headed "Judge Cradlebaugh," the same worthy who, it will be remembered, was once U. S. Associate Justice in this Territory, and who rendered himself particularly obnoxious, by his efforts to create trouble between the people of Utah and the General Government. The Reveille says that, now in a state of great destitution, and utterly helpless from wounds received at the siege of Vicksburg, he petitions the State of Nevada for additional compensation as Territorial Judge, and Senator Bonfield has introduced a bill, making an appropriation of \$4,500 for his benefit. The Reveille is strongly opposed to the passage of the bill: it says, Cradlebaugh never served Nevada in any capacity, and consequently the State owes him nothing; and if he has any right to additional compensation for his past services as a U. S. Judge, the Federal Government is the debtor and is able to pay the debt. The fact of his being needy and destitute is no reason why Nevada, bankrupt and unable to pay just claims, should pay him \$4,500: every pauper in the country has the same claim.

The ex-judge is seemingly in a pitiable plight: "destitute, and helpless," from his wounds, it would have been a more enviable fate if he had died at Vicksburg. But doubtless Providence had other views in store with regard to him. When in authority here he acted like a miserable poltroon and trickster; and he is now reaping his reward. He labored assiduously to bring trouble upon the people here, but the pit he tried to dig for them he has seemingly fallen into himself. This is the fate in store for the whole class: they will have their day and then go to the dogs, like poor old Cradlebaugh!

DISLIKE OF TWINS.—A dislike of twins is widely distributed. In the island of Bali, near Java, the natives have the singular idea, when a woman is brought to bed of twins, that it is an unlucky omen, and immediately on its being known, the woman, with her husband and children, is obliged to go and live on the seashore, or among the tombs, for the space of a month, to purify themselves, after which they return to the village upon a suitable sacrifice being made. Thus an evidence of fertility among them is considered by them unfortunate, and the poor woman and her new born babes are exposed to all the inclemency of the weather out of doors, just at the time when they need the most attention. This idea is, however, far from being peculiar to that island. Among the Ainos of Japan, when twins are born, one is destroyed. At Arebo, in Guinea, Smith and Bosman tell us when twins are born, both they and their mother are killed. "In Niguru, one of the sister provinces to Wayanyembe, twins are ordered to be killed and thrown into the water the moment they are born, least droughts and famines or floods should oppress the land. Should any one attempt to conceal twins, the whole family would be murdered." The American Indians, also, on the birth of twins, kill one; perhaps merely under the idea that one strong child was better than two weak ones.

OBITUARY.

Bro. John H. Bleazard, late of Salt Lake City, deceased, was born in Newton, Yorkshire, England, February 28th, 1803, and died in this city January 13th, 1871.
Bro. Bleazard was baptized into the church in Preston, Lancashire, in the year of our Lord 1836. He was ordained an Elder in the Church, at Manchester, on the 7th of July, 1840, under the hands of Elder Parley P. Pratt, and emigrated to America during the same year. He ever proved himself a faithful and tried friend to the martyred Prophet. No sacrifice or exertions were wanting on his part to aid the cause of Zion in the days of the Prophet Joseph, and his integrity knew no bounds, and though not among the first to come to Utah, he voluntarily gave his outfit to others to aid them across the plains; and so soon as he could procure another outfit, he came to Salt Lake City with his family, where he underwent many trials and exhibited some peculiar traits of character: but amidst all his trials and vexations, his integrity to the cause did not in the least abate; and through persevering industry and strict economy, he has left his family in comfortable circumstances. He died in peace, and fully in the faith of the Gospel of Christ, and has gone to receive the reward of his labors. Peace to his ashes!—[Com.]
