DESERETEVENING NEWS | SALARIES OF CITY OFFICIALS.

Revised Ordinances in an Effort To Readjust Some of Them.

CITY ATTORNEY'S IS CUT DOWN.

Pay of the City Auditor Increased From \$1,500 to \$1,800 Per Annum-Other Changes.

A number of amendments were made to the revised ordinances of the city last night by The city council, principally in regard to salaries of the various officials. Some of the salaries were placed at even a lower figure than at the present time. The third readings of the ordinances up to section 73 were made last evening. The city attorney's salary was fixed at \$2,500 instead of \$3,000 per annum as provided in the revised ordinance. The

provided in the revised ordinance. The salary agreed upon is an increase of \$100 over the present salary.

After considerable discussion the first assistant city attorney's salary was fixed at \$2,000 per annum as provided in the revised ordinance. This is an increase of \$500 over the present salary. The increase was opposed by several members of the council but City Atty. Nye took the floor and convinced them that the salary as proposed was very reasonable. He said that the first assistant is a very busy man and should really be paid as much as the city attorney. The salary was then fixed at the amount man and should really be paid as much as the city attorney. The salary was then fixed at the amount named in the revised ordinance. The salary of the second assistant was fixed at \$1,200 per annum, an increase of \$300. The stenographer a salary was increased from \$600 to \$720 per annum.

CITY AUDITOR'S INCREASED. The salary of the city auditor was increased from \$1,500 to \$1,800 per annum, as provided in the revised ordinance, and his deputy's salary remained the same, \$1,290. The clerk's salary was fixed at the same, \$900 per

BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.

There was considerable discussion upon the salaries of the chairman and members of the board of public works. The present salaries are \$200 and \$25 per and \$400. An amendment fixing the salaries at \$500 and \$25 per annum respectively and it was proposed in the revised ordinance to increase them to \$1,000 and \$500 per annum. President Cottrell and others vigorously protested against such an increase. They also opposed an amendment making the salaries \$720 and \$400. An amendment fixing the salaries at \$500 and \$200 per annum was finally passed. finally passed.

The salary of the clerk of the board of public works was decreased from \$1,500 to \$900 per year.

REMAINS THE SAME.

The building inspector's salary remained the same, \$960 per year, but provision was made for him to receive \$1 per hour overtime.

NO MORE BREAKDOWNS.

Huge Generators Being Installed Which Will Operate Street Cars.

The Utah Light & Power company s setting up a monster generator in the central power station, that weighs 175,000 pounds and cost \$30,000. This machine is rated at 750 kilowats, but can be forced to carry a load of 2,000 horse power without breaking down, It will, in fact, carry the average load It will, in fact, carry the average load of the street railway alone. With the two generators stationed in front, the three machines will carry any load the street car company may call for, and the new generator will be ready for operating in about 12 days. It was ordered last December, and was to have been delivered Oct. 1, but was delayed for nearly two months.

The power company has ordered a second \$20,000 generator to be placed alongside the one now being installed, and if that is not enough, a third giant generator will be ordered. The Power company is installing this year \$50,000 worth of machinery, so that there will be no trouble hereafter with shortage of power.
