**Museum.**—Received with the thanks of the Curator, the following donations to the Desert Museum: A copy of prose and poetry from the author, Sister Emily B. Spencer. The Second Book of Our Little Friends, and a set of needles made at the Royal Exhibition of 1851, showing the various stages of manufacture from the wire to the finished needle, from Brother Levi W. Richards. Some fossils collected by Brother Geo. Q. Coray, from the summit of Mount Nebo, have been presented by him to the collection. Also a specimen of petrified wood from Rockport, has been given by Brother Henry Seamons, of that settlement.

**Ornamental Lettering.**—For some weeks past, Mr. Wm. C. Morris, painter of this city, has been engaged in lettering the windows of Z. C. M. I., and now that the work is rapidly approaching completion we have no hesitation in pronouncing it one of the most skillful pieces of workmanship we have lately seen. There are twelve windows in all, the lettering on each window indicating the various branches of business done in the Co-op. Much of the lettering is the original design of Mr. Morris, and the manner in which the whole job has been worked out, at once places Mr. Morris as a letterer, in the front rank of the trade. He has equal artistic abilities in other branches of his profession. The Co-op is well known as one of the largest mercantile houses in the country, and it may now be safely said that the ornamental lettering on its windows will bear comparison with that of any other establishment, no matter where it may be situated.

**Zamloch.**—As previously announced, Zamloch, the Austrian conjurer, gave his first entertainment in the Theatre last evening, in the presence of a good sized audience. Zamloch is all that is said about him. He is an exceedingly clever magician. Many of his tricks, it is true, are old, yet the graceful and easy manner in which they were performed, brought forth the frequent applause of the audience. A great many conjurers are in the habit of doing a vast deal of talking and very little acting, but in Zamloch's case, although he is by no means short of humor, the thing is different. No sooner is one trick disposed of than another is "proceeded with, and in this way the interest of the audience is incessantly kept up. The furniture and fittings used by Zamloch are very chaste and artistically placed on the stage; while the display of presents, neatly arranged on tables in front of the footlights has a very pleasing effect. At the close of the entertainment, 150 presents were distributed among the audience. The gifts appeared to be of a substantial kind, and the holders of prize numbers seemed highly pleased with the presents. The performance will be repeated this evening, when doubtless a much larger audience will be present on the occasion.

**The Turner Murder.**—In conversation with one of two of the police officers this morning, we elicited information that Welcome and Emerson, since their judgment in the Penitentiary together, have quarreled considerably, and that General Butler, to prevent anything serious occurring between the two, has decided to put Welcome into an entirely separate compartment. Emerson, it appears, has never missed an opportunity of accusing Welcome of the most dastardly cowardice in getting him into this trouble. He keeps telling Welcome that his whole story is a pack of lies from beginning to end, and Welcome, it is said, although he has never manifested the most dogged, sullen disposition, has at times become so exasperated at Emerson's incessant attacks, that he threatens to kill him if he does not desist, remarking that he might as well do so as he knows he has got to die. General Butler, therefore, having no desire to allow any killing business in the Pen., has, we understand, decided to take Welcome from amongst the general crowd of prisoners and place him in a separate cage.

Now that the public have had time to reflect upon the case, we find that the opinion is gaining ground that Welcome has alone committed this horrible murder, and that the deed must have been done on the night of the 3rd of July. By a reference to Emerson's statement, as published in the News on Tuesday evening, it will be found that Welcome was alone on the morning of the 5th, but Emerson wishful as he said to see the "4th" over, would not go, and did not start until 5 o'clock on the morning of the 6th. They stopped at Wanship and sold some grain, and when they got to Echo, Emerson, suffering from the effects of the drink he had during the previous two days, wanted to camp at Echo, but Welcome, making some slim excuse, preferred to go five or six miles further. When they came to their camping place, Emerson immediately lay down, and this is the place at which he missed Welcome for two or three hours. Now, if this be true, was Welcome during this three hours? Had he time to take the body of Turner out of the Wagon (supposing it was there) and deposit it where it was afterwards found? Immediately after this, Emerson complained of a foul smell and discovered some blood on the pillow.

Altogether, when the two statements are put together, the public seem inclined, in the absence of further proof, to believe that Emerson has been innocently dragged into this matter. But, as Welcome has already remarked, "time will tell."
