LOCAL BRIEFS.

Burgen Made Chairman—The board of canal presidents met yesterday afternoon in the city engineer's office and chose E. L. Burgen chairman of the board.

Dies at Advanced Age—John A. Clark of this city has received word from England of the death of his mother at Cambridge at the age of 96 years.

Add Men to Range Force—Six men were sent last evening to the new, forest planting station at the Wasatch reserve and 12 more men will be sent down next Monday.

Goes to See Talking Pictures—Max Florence, manager of the Elite theater, has gone to San Francisco to examine new talking picture machines on exhibition there.

Butchers and Grocers' Outing—The Butchers and Grocers' association will give an outing at Saltair on the evening of the 13th inst. preliminary to holding a barbecue later in the season. The committee of arrangements includes F. H. Weight, chairman; H. A. Milam, A. N. Olsen, E. C. Allen and Orson Horgan.

Third District Meeting—The Third judicial district Republican committee will meet Saturday morning at 9 o'clock in the court room of Judge Ritchie to select a temporary chairman and permanent officers for the judicial convention, which will be held Saturday at 11 o'clock on that day in the same place.

HOW TO MAKE LAWNS.

The board of park commissioners yesterday made the following announcement in reference to water main connections for sprinkling boulevards along the parking districts: "The board of park commissioners in aiding the residents in their efforts to beautify their grounds in cases where lots are vacant, to establish lateral connection with the water main (the cost of connection will not exceed \$8) to give an opportunity for taking proper care of the sprinkling. The board will further furnish on application printed regulations for making of permanent lawns.

"Instructions in the care of trees, planting, spraying, etc., can be had at the office of the superintendent of parks."

COUNCIL APPEARS SOMEWHAT AFRAID

On Second Thought, Aldermen Will Not Attend Service Officially.

BLACK REVEALS THE REASON

He and Other "Americans" Say They Could Not Stand Charges Being Hurlled in Their Direction.

MR. BLACK'S RESOLUTION.

Whereas, the Rev. Elmer I. Goshen, in a public sermon, made certain charges of wrongdoing against members of the municipal administration; and

Whereas, the council thereupon invited Mr. Goshen to substantiate those charges at such time and place as he might fix; and

Whereas, a letter from Mr. Goshen apprises the council that he will present his case on next Sunday morning in the First Congregational church in this city; therefore, be it

Resolved, that the city council will appear officially at the time and place proposed, hearing Mr. Goshen's charges and such evidence, oral or written, as he may desire to present, the council reserving to itself the initiative in all questions in the usual manner of official investigations. The proceedings will be under the direction of the council, the president thereof presiding, and conducting the examination precisely as if the hearing were in the council chamber or any day of the week. We shall expect Mr. Goshen to be prepared with his case and to conduct it under the direction and authority of the council.

The city council, as an official body, will not attend Rev. Goshen's church on Sunday next and listen to his tale of graft. It is doubtful if many of them will attend as individuals, even after accepting an invitation to do so. Councilman O'Donnell will be there, because he met Rev. Goshen and told him he would, but Councilman Black and Councilman Martin were strenuous in their opposition to sitting in the church, and having accusations hurled at them unless they went as an official body and as holding a public investigation and with a chance to "strike back."

BLACK TELLS WHY. The first evidence of "cold feet" in the manner was shown when Councilman Black introduced a resolution providing that the council attend the meeting Sunday as an official investigating body, and that as such they have charge of the church and the gathering, and that they require that Rev. Goshen be prepared with his charges and deliver them under the direction and authority of the council.

"I don't want to go there and have the preacher take a whack at me without having an opportunity to strike back," said Mr. Black. "I think we should go there as an official body, and not as individuals."

Councilman O'Donnell said he met Mr. Goshen during the day and promised him he would be there, and he was going to attend and hoped the rest of the council would do so as they had promised.

It was evident that the proposed expose has terrors in store for at least two of the councilmen, judging from the way they supported the resolution. Councilman Martin came over to the bar of the council from one of the side tables for which he had left his seat, and, raising his arm and shaking his hand, declared he would not go and sit in that church and be pointed to as a wild animal or a grafter.

"I want a chance, if I am attacked to defend myself," shouted Mr. Martin, "and I for one don't propose to sit up there as a target without having a chance to give the other fellow a shot."

This is the biggest force that ever happened," continued Mr. Martin. The idea of placing ourselves up there in a reserved seat for a preacher to after to me a preposterous idea, and I think the council should never have accepted the invitation."

NINE AGAINST RESOLUTION. The resolution finally came down to a vote, and was defeated by the following roll call:

For—Black, Martin, Holley, Fernstrom and Wood—5.

Against—Cowburn, Ferry, Hall, Hodgson, Murdoch, O'Donnell, Raybould, Reddick, Stewart—9.

Mr. Martin then moved that the council rescind its action in accepting the invitation to attend the church in a body, and this was also defeated by a vote standing the same as the vote on the motion.

By way of hilarity, Fernstrom moved a reconsideration of the motion for next Monday night, which resulted in a hearty laugh.

HEAR PROTEST. Fully an hour was taken up by the council last evening in discussing the Liberty Park street matter. The residents on the east side of the park objects to the street car company moving the car tracks over toward the east side of the street, which has been cut down to 66 feet, and want the city to give 15 feet from the eastern edge of the park for a sidewalk so that the double tracking of the car track will not interfere with the tracks as they are now laid.

Councilmen Hall and Hodgson favored the retention of the residents and wanted the tracks left as they are. Councilman Black charged the property owners of that section with wanting to dictate terms on the matter of the street, and that for the purpose of "making their property a little more valuable."

When the matter came to a vote the petition of the residents was defeated, and the tracks will be moved according to the wish of the street railway company.

PAT'S IRON HAND. "Pat" Murron caused a little scene in the chamber by his "previousness" in regard to the laying of the pavement on First South street. In order to expedite the work of paving it is

necessary that the water mains on the street be lowered, and while the regular procedure would include time for advertising and letting the contract in hand and offered by the contractor, several thousand dollars less than the regular contractor would do, and the board of public works accepted his proposition and told him to go to work. Councilman O'Donnell made a vigorous attack upon the city engineer for permitting such a piece of unwarranted privilege to take place. The contractor became very indignant indeed and asked "what is the use of having any committee at all, if the engineer is going to do all the work?" It makes the council look like a lot of ninnyes when they pass work over their heads like this.

Councilman Reddick backed O'Donnell's position and said the council has authority by the board and city engineer was entirely unwarranted. The agreement had been made, however, and the council took no adverse action.

ROUTINE MATTERS.

Street Supervisor Raleigh was instructed to keep the city engineer advised in regard to the cost of the needed repairs from time to time.

The petition of T. St. Ledger Atkins, paid by him upon an alleged shortage in the poll tax collections in the street department, was referred to the city attorney, auditor and street supervisor for a report.

The petition of James Gibson, former doorkeeper at the Salt Lake Theater, for a free license to sell a grog, was granted.

The sum of \$4.50 which was owing to Jacob Birkenhead, an employee of the city, was appropriated at the time of his death, was appropriated to the credit of Rocky Mountain lodge, K. of P., of which Mr. Birkenhead was a member.

Mr. O'Donnell favored the allowing of this \$4.50 for the purpose of assisting in defraying the funeral expenses of the deceased. Some members of the council, to which Mr. O'Donnell said, "in part by the name of Jones," amid the smiles of the councilmen.

Mr. O'Donnell introduced a resolution providing that no cement sidewalk be laid on the south side of Second South street, between Second and Third East streets, until the property owners have paid all claims for damages. The resolution was adopted. Mr. Fernstrom stated that the city might be liable for damages from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

Mr. O'Donnell introduced a resolution instructing the board of public works to advertise for bids for the construction of a water main to be ordered by the council from May 1 to Nov. 30, 1908.

The matter of the ordinance for submission to bond the city for \$800,000 came up in its regular order, but was disposed of by postponing action on the same for another week.
