CONCRESS OF IRRICATORS

Mass Meeting Held and Committees Named to Make All Arrangements.

A mass meeting of the citizens of Ogden was held last evening in the county courthouse in accordance with a call from the mayor, for the purpose of making preliminary arrangements for the Eleventh Irrigation congress, which is to be held in this city in September. There was a good attendance of the representative citizens of Ogden present.

Mayor Glasmann called the meeting to order and named Angus T. Wright as chairman and Willis Beardsley secre-tary of the meeting. After a short speech by the chairman on the importance of the congress coming to our city and the great benefits that will be de rived therefrom, the naming of com

mittees was proceeded with. Joseph Scowcroft was chosen as chairman of the finance committee and was empowered to appoint his own assistants. A board of control was appointed,

charged with the duty of appointing all committees necessary, it is composed of F. J. Kiesel, L. W. Shurtliff, A. T. Wright and William Glasmann. President Kiesel announced that the

date of the convening of the congress has been changed to Sept. 14 to 17. The following resolution was intro-duced, unanimously passed and a copy

of the same ordered telegraphed to Sen-ator W. A. Clark of Montana: "Whereas, Senator W. A. Clark of Montana has signified his acceptance of the presidency of the Irrigation con gress, tendered him by the executiv committee of that congress; now, there fore, be it "Resolved, that we the citizens of Og-

den in massmeeting assembled for the purpose of arranging for the reception and entertainment of the delegates to the Eleventh National Irrigation con gress, which meets in this city next September, do hereby extend to Senator Clark our most hearty and loyal sup port in his new duties; and, be it fur

Resolved. That we pledge the good will of the citizens not only of this city and county, but the entire state of Utah as well, to the aid and assistance of th work of the forthcoming congress, meaning as it does, so much, not only for the state of Utah, but to the entire west.

A resolution was also introduced by , J. Hendershot and carried setting forth the great opportunity the congress will afford Utah and especially Ogden to demonstrate to the thousands of vis-itors the resources of our state. The resolution also expressed the great ob ligation due Hon. F. J. Kiesel for the indefatigable efforts he has put forth to have the congress held in Ogden and

YOUNG GIRLS ARRESTED.

The police took into custody Mary Jenkins and Lizzle Peterson, two young girls, both fifteen years of age, who for several days have been roaming around the city apparently not knowing where to go and visiting places that are known to the officers to be of bad repute. The girls were arraigned be-fore Judge Howell on the charge of incorrigibility and were sent up Judge Rolapp for his consideration. Yesterday afternoon they told Dis-trict Attorney Halverson, the deputy sheriff and a reporter of their having been treated very improperly by cer-

tain women in the city. The names of two different women, who have deavored to induce the little girls to lead lives of shame, were given to the officers, and they may commence criminal proceedings against them. The story told by the girls portrays a shocking state of affairs. Judge Rolapp sent the Peterson girl to her home and the other girl to the Crittenden home. DISAGREEMENT OVER LICENSE.

Another meeting of the board of county commissioners was held late yesterday afternoon for the purpose of again considering the application of W. G. Wilson for a liquor license at the Hermitage in Ogden canyon. Commissioner Wilson made a short speech, stating that in the past he has endeavored to conduct an orderly house at his summer resort and asked Commissioner Stanford why he opposed the granting of the licence and if he had personal desires to gratify in the pro-position. SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY. What most excites our wonder at the What most excites our wonder at the present day is perhaps the extreme sensitiveness of mon-made instruments. The belometer of Dr. Langley amased us 20 years ago by mensuring temperatures to the one-hundred-bousandth of a degree, but as now improved it records easily the one-hundred-millionth of a degree. The coherer responds to electric waves incalculably reduced by scattering to 3,000 miles. The most deficit balance may weigh a millionth of a gram, and the spectroscope may show a billioneth of a gram or less of some substances, but the electrometer is now dealing with the even more inconceivably small. We are told, in fact, that if 1,000 grams of thorium gave out the thousandth of a gram of under in a million years, the radiation from one gram in one second would be sufficient to affect the electrometer.

Some bactoria, large fungi and rotten wood are known to glow in the dark, he shrubs and flowering plants are not us-ually credited with the property of phos-phorescence. Dr. H. Beckurtz, however, has lately discovered an old record of phosphorescence in an Indian grass known to the Drahmins as "dottshimati." The account is of much interest to botan-ists, but, while the plant has not been dentified with certainty, it is concluded that the observer was led into error by phosphorescent bacteria on the grass.

The late discovery in strawberries of salicylic acid, a specific in acute rheuma-tism, has seemed to confirm the idea that these berries are a desirable article of food for rheumatics. The effect of the fruit cannot be due to the salicylic acid however, as less than the hundredth of a grain per pound is found.
