A BLOUSE OF SATIN AND LACE.

The new princess point lace, as it is called, is one of the fads in fancy work for the summer time. It is one of those recent developments in lace looking whereby a machine-made braid is twisted into a pattern, and threads following the best known lace stitches to connect the different parts of the pattern. Such is the lace that forms a yoke with pear-shaped pendants to a smart ivory white satin blouse, and it is used also with excellent effect on the sleeve and cuff. The fastening is effected in the back, thus leaving the fronts free and unbroken to develop the design. Fine pin tucks are run at the top, and these are released to make the necessary fullness below the bust. The sleeve is a full puff to below the elbow, where the long lace cuff with satin lining—reversing the usual mode of procedure—meets the elbow puff. The familiar little rods of feather bone support the plain and high collar.

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NOVEL DEVELOPMENT OF THE LINGERIE HAT.



These becomingly large and flaring shapes are at their best when developed over the lingerie mode. The shepherds are a favorite style for this and the more recent models in these show a crown that is higher and a little more conical than formerly. In the illustration such a shape is covered with overlapping ruffles of a delicate Normandie lace, both the top and under side of the brain being similarly treated, while the crown is simply a mass of them. There is a band in the head size that lifts the fringe most becomingly off the face in front, this narrowing down to nothing at all in the back. The only trimming is a large and compact bunch of La Prairie roses in all of their charming natural tints at the side, the accompanying foliage likewise reproducing the green and copper tones of the rose tree. The shape is bent in a trifle to the head in the back, and the low coiffure deftly covered with a smart coiffure hair net.
