A STRIKE IMMINENT.

Stone Cutters at Federal Building Object to Machine Work.

The use of a labor-saving machine at the Federal building threatens to result in the strike or withdrawal of the union stonecutters from that job, and the substitution of a machine for the hand labor as far as may be found necessary. The threatened cause is the use of a new stone planer, which will do the work of 45 men, and which was first brought out in Chicago. The device, one of the most effective ever invented for rapid work, and it is claimed, that it shaves or planes off a stone with the cast of an ordinary planing mill on lumber. When first introduced in Chicago, it did the work apparently so quickly and well, that contractors all went in for it, and one result was the throwing of so many stonecutters out of work as to threaten the industry of the city with a strike, except in ornamental work.
