# INCREASED ACTIVITY IN EASTERN TINTIC

New Part of Camp Promises to Produce Some Mines as Good as Those That Made Camp Famous.

Although the old ploneers of the East Tintic district have practically prospected every foot of ground in the East Tintle district, at the present time that district seems fairly alive with prospectors, miners and mining investors. In the days when John Bestelmeyer, Charles Lammersdorf and others trudged their way over the hills to the east of Eureka, months and months east of Eureka, months and months would pass without a human face making its appearance in that section of the now famous mining camp. Now there is scarcely a hill or a gulch that does not present some sign of the miner or prospector getting busy. Hoists, tents, cabins, tunnels and shafts seem to be everywhere.

With the prospector and miner has come thousands of dollars' worth of improvements. A new roadway now goes up over the hill from Eureka, to the properties of the Grutil, Provo, Eureka Lilly and others in that part of the district. At the Grutil the hoist is now working and under the management of John M. Bestelmeyer the shaft

ment of John M. Bestelmeyer the shaft is going down by jumps. Further down the gulch the Provo is doing some effective work that promises results shortly. Then the Eureka Lilly is getting some good ore and across the road is the East Tintic Development.

BOULDER OF ORE.

The East Tintic Development company has been taking out considerable high grade ore of late, and an inspection of that property Sunday by a large number of mining men satisfied them that for some time to come it could be counted among the shippers of the district. The farther down they go the richer the ore is. Sunday morning a large boulder of Galena ore, weighing over 150 pounds, was taken out and sent to Eureka as a sample of what they have. This would probably assay 82 per cent lead. The other properties in that district are also being rapidly developed and as soon as any depth is reached they too will be producers it is believed. The operators are all confident that they will get rich lead ores in this district, as were those in the vicinity of the Colorado mine at the time when the discoveries were first being made there. first being made there.

AT THE MONTANA.

Over in the far east section of the district are many more properties with excellent indications of riches below the ground. The Montana is pounding away with its three compartment shaft and it is one of the many companies with great expectations. If surface indications count for anything it seems almost a certainty that this company will get the ore. A dozen or more promising properties could be named in this section.

North Tintic is also showing considerable activity and the summer campaign of development and prospecting has set in with vigor. The Wanlass Mining company and the Lehi Tintic, which is being worked by leasers, are doing considerable work. The old Gold Blossom which has been idle for several years is now active again.

# DECKER CANYON MINE STRIKES GOOD ORE

Silver and Gold at 640 Foot in Tunnel-Is 40 Feet Wide.

(Special to the "News.") Provo. June 25.-Secretary P. P. Hindmarsh of the Decker Mining anyon Mining company was today exibiting some fine looking ore encounhibiting some fine looking ore encountered in the company's tunnel. The ore was struck at a distance of \$40 feet from the portals of the tunnel and the foot wall was encountered. It is asserted that the vein is 40 feet wide, although it is not all ore. Some of the specimens shown by Mr. Hindmarsh assay 22 per cent lead, 15 ownces in silver and \$1.40 in gold a ton. The development work is being pushed ahead on the vein and it is expected that a good ore bod; will be developed.

erty consists of 13 claims in the Beck-er Canyon mining district in Utah county. It is northwest from the town of Charleston. The property is two and a half miles from the Mountain Lake property and three miles from the Heber branch of the Rio Grande Western

The present company was organized early this your and President Jesse Buckner has had considerable work done on the property in the past few months. A tunnel of several hundred feet had been run at the time the property was taken over by the present owners. When work was commenced the tunnel ran into a cave which contained no ore, but gave indications of the presence of an ore body. The work was then pushed ahead to the present point.

At the Tintic Humboldt property in north Tintic the shaft has encountered some values. The shaft is between 50 and 75 feet deep.

WORKING ON HORN SILVER ORE

Trying Out New Process for Treatment

Of Beaver County Rock.

Chicago, June 25.—A buldge of ¾ to ¾ marked initial trades in the wheat market today. The sharp upturn is due to general commission house demand based chiefly on an advance of ¾ to 2d at Liverpool and on the German crop report which indicated a deterioration of 18 points in the condition of the winter wheat crop compared with the same time a year ago. The July delivery opened at 1.14¾ to 1.15¼ and for a time held within the opening range.

The corn market was strong at the start owing to covered by shorts, but later eased off on realizing sales. July, which opened ¼ to ½ higher at 63½ to 70, sold off to 69¼.

Oats were firm at the opening in sympathy with wheat and corn but lost much of their firmness on scattered selling. July opened ¼ to ¾ higher at 50 to 50½ and fell off to 43%.

Provisions were firm early in the session owing to a 5c. advance in live hogs. Prices were 2½ to 12½c. higher.
