Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 30.65 inches. Temperature at 6 a. m., 71 degrees; maximum, 84; minimum, 51; mean, 65, which is 3 degrees below normal.

Excess of daily mean temperature since Aug. 1, 24 degrees. Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 264 degrees.

The temperature is warmer 10 degrees to 15 degrees over portions of Utah, Colorado, Idaho, and Oregon; and cooler 10 degrees over Kansas, with slight variations at other points.

The Fort Douglas military authorities are anxious to ascertain the whereabouts of Private Ross of the Twenty-second light battery, who was doing duty in the post guardhouse for desertion and escaped with two other artillerymen who were also minded to travel without leave or license.

The two, Privates Smith of the Twenty-second battery, and James Gandy of the Tenth battery, are "back to the old home"—the guardhouse, but Ross continues on his quest. The officers of the post have been giving the guardhouse and its contents a thorough overhauling, and found saws, files and other tools evidencing the existence of a systematic scheme for the liberation of prisoners.
