SHEFFIELD CONFERENCE.

This report is kindly sent the News by Elder John H. Horsley, clerk of the Shefileld conference. It is dated Shef-field, England, March 23:

The semi-annual Sheffield conference of the Latter-day Saints commenced with a Priesthood meeting at 2 c'clock p. m.
