Heat from Electricity.

Little has yet been done in heating by electricity. The common selief is instit would be too costly. We can get 60 per cent of the total energy as useful heat from a furnace and but ten per cent from an electric current de-rived from a dynamo run by s.eam. Stoves do most of the heating in towns, and they give but one fourth of the total energy injuseful heat. Three-fourths of the heat passes up the chimney. Air rushes through crevices of doors and windows in draughts

which are injurious to tealth. Suppose the case of a house heated by electricity in a town. Let the cur-rent come from the central station and heat coils of fist-iron wire. These coils may each cost less than a dollar, and they may be in any part of the house. For cooking or baking the

coils may be placed just under or around the vessel holding the article cooked. Less heat than usual would be nequired, for no soot would be on the bottom of the containing essels. The fire risk would be much less than at present, as the wire never need be hot enough to cause fires. The heat supply can be turned on or off instantly; thus there will be no loss of fael when the need of heat has ceased. This applies with great force to the summer

In heating, cooking or baking, the temperature can be easily kept uni-form. Without rising in the morning, the touch of a button at the bedsid will turn heat on several coils in dif ferent parts of the house. The nui-sence of kindling, smoke, ashes and et will be abolished, and no stove-
