It is widely reported at Dainy that the Japanese killed or wounded in front of Port Arthur during the last three months approximate 40,000.

These Japanese, however, are confident that the end of the Russian occupation of Port Arthur s fast approaching. EXCAVATIONS AT BISMAYA.

American Legation Seeking Permission to Resume Them.

Constantinople, Nov. 4 .-- The American legation is now seeking permission from the Turkish government for the resumption of the excavations con-ducted by Dr. E. S. Banks, director of the University of Chicago expedition to Babylonia at Bismaya, Mesopotamia, which were suspended pending an instigat American Vice Consul Turner at Bagdad of charges of complicity on the part of Dr. Banks in the alleged disvaluable antiquities. appearance of These charges were proved to be utterly without foundation.

New York, Nov. 4 .- A thick blanket of fog, which settled down over New York city and harbor during the night, seriously disarranged traffic both by land and water today and resulted in at least one serious accident. The ferryboal Columbia of the Wall street line was run buto and sunk by the Norwich liner City of Lowell. There were about 150 passengers and 17 teams on board the Columbia. All of the passengers were taken off in safety, but eight or ten horses were drowned. The City of Lowell was coming down the river and in the dense fog struck the Columbia amidships, just clear of

the puddlewheel. The Columbia floated around for a while and began to settle. A huwser was thrown from the City of Lowell and the Columbia made fast and all the passengers so far as known were taken on board the steamboat. Later the hawser parted in some unaccountable manner and the Columbia finally sank near one of the slips of the Union Ferry company on the Brooklyn aldo.

Nearly eighty per cent of the total number of teachers are Gentiles. It is estimated that there are about 2,500 more "Mormon" children in the public schools of the city than children of Gentile parents. It is further estimated that about one-half of the population of Salt Lake City is "Mormon." The city superintendent of schools is a "Mormon." His secretary

is a Gentile; the secretary of the board of education is a Gentile; the assistant secretary of the board of education is a Gentile; the examining board for teachers is composed of three Gentiles and one "Mormon." The supervisors of "Mormon." The supervisors of "Mormon." The principals of the pub-lic schools are eight "Mormons" and seventeen Gentiles. The total amount paid to teachers of the public schools of Salt Lake City, Utah, annually, is about \$222,000; of this amount nearly \$175,000 is paid to Gentile teachers and \$47,000 to "Mormon" teachers. CHINAMAN MURDERED,

In Ante Mortem Statement Says Woman Assaulted Him,

New York, Nov. 4 .- Wo Kee, a Chinese laundryman, is dead from nine terrible wounds on his head and face, received during a fight today in his laundry with a white woman companion. The woman, who says she is Mollie Donovan, 22 years old, of Philadelphia, is in a dangerous condition in a nospital, from several deep cuts in her head and shoulders, and is a prisoner, on the charge of causing the China-

on the charge of causing the China-man's death. Wo Kee, in a statement before he died, said that the woman assaulted him with a cleaver while he was asleep, and claimed that he inflicted her wounds in defending himself. A police-man, attracted to the laundry by the calls of the woman for help, said the place resembled a shamble. Both Wo Kee and Mollie Donoyan were teken to Kee and Mollie Donovan were taken to a hospital and there the Chinaman died soon after telling his story of the affair.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4, 1 p. m -While no formal reply will be made to the Japanese protest regarding the use of Chinese clothing by the Russian troops it is understood that Foreign Minister Lamsdorff, when the protest was presented informally but categorieally denied the truth of the charge that there had been a violation of the Geneva convention. He explained that

Constantinople, Nov. 4 .- The Porte has not prohibited the American society from carrying on its work in Turkey. There has been slight friction in four towns in the provinces, where the local authorities forbade sirvet sales of the society's literature, arrested the ven-ders and seized their books. Upon representations made by the American legation, however, the porte promptly or-dered the liberation of the persons arrested and the surrender of the books taken from them.
