THE JAPANESE LOCATE RUSSIANS.

They Are Using Dogs to Find Positions of Sentinels And Outposts

FRESH TROOPS GO TO FRONT.

As Dainty Recaptured Japs Have Lost Forty Thousand Men Around Port Arthur.

THE MOUNTAIN FORTS OCCUPIED.

End of Siege of Great Fort Seems Near—Besiegers Were Never So Confident as Now.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4.—A special dispatch from Mukden says the Japanese are using dogs to locate the positions of the Russian sentinels and outposts.

PORT ARTHUR DOOMED.

Chetov, Nov. 4, 9:30 p. m.—Chinese who left Port Dalny yesterday evening report that batches of wounded Japanese were being sent to the rear.

They report also that during the recent battle fresh Japanese troops were constantly going to the front.

It is widely reported at Dalny that the Japanese killed or wounded in front of Port Arthur during the last three months approximate 40,000.

There are persistent rumors that the Japanese have occupied the forts on Rihlung mountain and certain forts of the Keelung mountain group, but well informed Japanese here consider these rumors as premature. These Japanese, however, are confident that the end of the Russian occupation of Port Arthur is fast approaching. They admit that they have been disappointed heretofore, but say that their previous hopes never had such a fact-based foundation as those they at present entertain.

The fact that Gen. Nogai, commander of the Third Japanese army before Port Arthur, has allowed the Associated Press dispatches to leave the front at the rate of his operations is looked upon as strongly indicating the confident spirit of the besiegers.

Further tidings of events at Port Arthur are awaited here with an intensity of interest greater than any displayed since the beginning of the war.

POSITIONS CAPTURED.

Shanghai, Nov. 4.—The British steamer Victoria, which succeeded in running the Port Arthur blockade with a full cargo of coal, has returned here, confirms the reports that the Japanese have captured all the main northeastern positions of the fortress.

ASSAULT CONTINUES.

Shanghai, Nov. 4.—Advices reaching Shanghai today say that the Japanese assault on Port Arthur continues with unabated vigor and that the Russian defense is dogged and determined.

The northern portion of East Keelung mountain has been captured by the Japanese, who hold it under a furious Russian fire.

A fort on the inner line of defenses was destroyed by the explosion of a magazine on Nov. 2.

The casualties of the Japanese are reported to be enormous. A belief prevails that the Russian warships will make another attempt to escape.

QUEER EXPLANATION OF NORTH SEA INCIDENT.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 4, 1 p. m.—The possibility that there have been some misunderstanding of signals during the trawler incident in the North Sea is suggested by a fact made public in an order of the day issued by Vice Admiral Rozhkov, commander of the Black Sea fleet, which records the fact that officers of the latter fleet are so unfamiliar with the new code system adopted by the admiralty that during the recent maneuvers not a single ship understood or obeyed the admiral's signals.

A LONG SEARCH ENDS.

Long Sought Grandson Had Been Long Dead.

New York, Nov. 4.—Persistent search for her grandson, which Mrs. Julia Van Alstyne of Auburn, N. Y., has carried on promulgately for three years, has ended in a discovery that the body of an unidentified child buried in an unmarked grave by the city was that of her missing grandchild. She had secured an order to disinter the body and bury it at the side of the boy's mother in a little cemetery near Auburn.

Three years ago the boy, then 19 years old, disappeared from the asylum for the feeble minded at Rome, where his grandmother had placed him a year before. Thousands of dollars had been spent in the search and finally, after the grandmother came here and, by her son, canvassed all the public institutions, carrying with her a photograph of the boy.

Her search was rewarded at the Bronx morgue, where the keeper recognized the picture as that of a boy who had shot himself and then taken carbolic acid in Bronx park July 21, 1901, leaving nothing behind by which he could be identified.

ENGLISH OFFICERS.

Will Be Sent to Japan for a Course of Study.

London, Nov. 2.—An order issued to day was that four officers, not above the rank of captain, will annually be selected for a two years' course of study, with residence in Japan.

Sheepman a Suicide.

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 3.—Peter Faure, a wealthy sheep owner, became despondent because his wife, from whom he was separated, refused to return to him, and committed suicide. Faure took poison.

FORTY ORPHAN CHILDREN.

Governor Brodie, on President's Order, Goes to Clifton and Morenci to Gather Them Up.

WILL BE RETURNED TO NEW YORK.

Sisters Say That They Are in the Custody of Disreputable People.

Denver, Nov. 4.—A special to the Rocky Mountain News from Prescott, Ariz., says: "Atty.-Gen. Wells of Arizona has received a private letter from Phoenix stating that Gov. Brodie has quietly left there for Clifton and Morenci, under orders from President Roosevelt, to gather up the 40 orphans recently taken away from the sisters of mercy, and to prepare at once to return them to New York. The sisters claim that a majority of the 40 orphans are now in the custody of disreputable people. The letter received by Wells is the first authentic information bearing on the movements of the governor, who left Phoenix without letting his purpose be known.

The governor is said to fear trouble when he tries to take the children, and has instructed Capt. Rynning of the Arizona Rangers at Douglas to be ready to quell any disturbances that may arise.

SAFE CRACKER GOT PROBABLY \$30,000.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 4.—A special from Warsaw, N. Y., says the safe of James L. Bloodgett at Hermitage was blown open today and from \$25,000 to \$30,000 stolen. Bloodgett has conducted a private bank for the past four years. Another dispatch says Mr. Bloodgett, who has been in the city since his loss, but it is generally believed a very substantial sum was taken.

ANGLO-RUSSIAN CONVENTION.

Nothing Settled About Personnel And Venue.

London, Nov. 4.—Regarding the reports of the complexion of the Anglo-Russian convention the foreign office this afternoon reiterated that while an agreement in principle appears to have been reached regarding the form and scope of the international commission, nothing has yet been settled about the venue and personnel, and nothing can be definitely settled until the authorities at St. Petersburg have an opportunity to examine the text of the draft of the convention which is expected to arrive there tonight.

RIOTING STUDENTS.

At Innsbruck Are Suppressed by The Military.

Innsbruck, Austria, Nov. 4.—The rioting of the students at the university here, which began yesterday, became so serious during the night that the troops with fixed bayonets marched into the midst of the German demonstrators. At 2 o'clock this morning the latter were besieging and wrecking the hotels occupied by the Italian students. An artist named Terezy was killed by a bayonet thrust through the chest. The building occupied by the Italian faculty of the university was wrecked.

RABBI FREUND COMING.

Reformed Jewish Church of This City Decides to Call Him.

The Reformed Jewish Congregation, B'nai Israel, of this city has decided to call to its vacant pulpit Rabbi Charles A. Freund of Washington, D. C. The trustees have heard very favorably of Dr. Freund for some time, and had about determined to call him, when Judge Woolf arrived from the east, and his advice was solicited. The judge decided in favor of Freund, and he was found, and that he would prove acceptable in every way. So the new Rabbi will shortly receive a formal call. He is expected here Nov. 20, and to deliver his first sermon Dec. 2.

TERMS SATISFACTORY.

Prof. McClellan's Offer to Play Big Organ Has Been Accepted.

Prof. McClellan's terms to play the big Festival hall organ at the world's fair have been accepted by the bureau of music at the St. Louis exposition. He received a telegram to that effect today and will leave Salt Lake to effect his engagement about the 18th inst.

HUNDRED PERSONS DROWNED BY SINKING OF FRENCH STEAMER.

Bona, Algeria, Nov. 4.—A hundred persons were drowned last night by the sinking of the French steamer Glorinde, after having been in collision with the French steamer A. Schifano near Herbillon, 23 miles from Bona. The Glorinde left Bona with 110 passengers, of whom 100 were Algerian natives.

BOOTH ARRANGS THE "AMERICANS"

Non-"Mormon" Points Out Their False Attitude on the School Question.

GIVES FACTS AND FIGURES.

Comprehensive Review of Actual Conditions as Regards "Mormons" And Gentiles.

One of the most spirited meetings of the campaign was that held last night by the Republicans in the Twentieth ward annex. There was a splendid crowd present and good music was rendered during the evening. The principal speaker was Hon. Hiram E. Booth, who scathingly arraigned the "American" party for its false attitude on the "Mormon" question in general, and the school question in particular. Mr. Booth said:

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen—I have been requested to address you this evening upon the question, "Should any Gentile Vote the American Party Ticket on November 8?"

To begin with, I desire to call your attention to the fact that I am a non-"Mormon"; that none of my family or relatives are "Mormons." From my arrival in Utah in 1888 until a division on party lines in 1894, I was a member of the liberal party, and was elected to the council of the Legislature in 1894, as a Liberal, and to the first state senate of Utah as a Republican.

My record as a member of the two Legislatures referred to is an open book, and no one can charge me with ever having voted, or acted otherwise than for the best interests of the whole people of Utah. I intend to make this state my permanent home. I have never visited any of the presidents of the "Mormon" church, nor asked any high official of that church to help either myself or any of my friends to get office. I have many friends among those who have joined the so-called "American party" and give the rank and file of that party credit for being sincere and earnest; but, at the same time, I believe many of them are misled into supporting that party, when they know the real facts, there would not be a dozen people in the whole city of Salt Lake that would vote the "American party" ticket.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

One of my friends recently told me that he was going to vote the "American party" ticket to keep that party together, so that they could rescue the public schools from "Mormon" domination. He asked him the question: "Does the Mormon Church want to take the public schools in Salt Lake?" And he answered, "Yes, sir," in great earnestness. He is one of the large tax payers and a man who ought to have made a careful examination before he spoke as he did regarding the public schools. I proceeded at once to make an investigation, as there is not a person in Utah that would make a protest quicker than I should find that any church was dominating the public schools of Salt Lake City. As a result of my investigation I found the following to be the actual facts:

The board of education is composed of five "Mormons" and five Gentiles; the teachers in the high schools are two "Mormons" and thirty-five Gentiles; in the East Side High school there are ten Gentile teachers. The total number of teachers in Salt Lake City public schools is 74 "Mormons" and 230 Gentiles. Nearly eighty per cent of the total number of teachers are Gentiles.

It is estimated that there are about 2,500 more "Mormon" children in the public schools of the city than children of Gentile parents. It is further estimated that about one-half of the population of Salt Lake City is "Mormon." The city superintendent of schools is a "Mormon." His secretary is a Gentile; the secretary of the board of education is a Gentile; the assistant secretary of the board of education is a Gentile; the examining board for teachers is composed of three Gentiles and one "Mormon." The supervisors of the teachers are three Gentiles and one "Mormon." The principals of the public schools are eight "Mormons" and seventeen Gentiles. The total amount paid to teachers of the public schools of Salt Lake City, Utah, annually, is about \$222,000; of this amount nearly \$175,000 is paid to Gentile teachers and \$47,000 to "Mormon" teachers.

I have here in my possession the names and addresses of every teacher, including principals and high school teachers in Salt Lake City; and a statement showing whether they are "Mormons" or Gentiles, and if any one has any doubt about the truthfulness of my statement, he can take this list and make a personal investigation for himself. I will be pleased to furnish such a list to anyone upon application.

INFIRMARY MATTERS.

It has been charged by the American party organ that the Gentile firms and stores in Salt Lake are getting the worst of it in the goods and supplies purchased for the benefit of the indigents of Salt Lake county. I found on investigation that there are 104 inmates of the county infirmary. Eighty of these inmates are Gentiles and 24 are classed as "Mormons." It is estimated, correctly as I believe, that 50 per cent of the monies paid out by the county to help poor and distressed people is paid out for the benefit of what is known as "transients," all of whom are Gentiles. Of the remainder at least one-half is paid out for the benefit of Gentiles, making a total of about 75 per cent for Gentiles and 25 per cent for "Mormons." And this in a county more than one-half of the population of which is "Mormon."

COUNTY PATRONAGE.

On further investigation I ascertained that from 75 to 90 per cent of the goods and supplies purchased for the indigents of Salt Lake county were purchased from Gentile firms. Anyone doubting this statement can apply to Pauper Clerk Sabine and make an investigation for himself of the books kept by the county, where the names of "Mormon" and Gentile firms from whom goods have been purchased can be obtained, and the amounts purchased from each of the same.

STATE OFFICES.

One of my friends said he was going to vote the "American" party ticket

because the Gentiles did not receive a fair proportion of the office, and I proceeded to investigate to see whether that statement was true or not, with the following result:

I desire to call attention to that out of the total population of Utah about 70 per cent are "Mormons."

The foregoing shows about an even division of the county offices.

In many of the offices held by "Mormons" the salaries are less than those of the Gentile assistants. In the sheriff's office there are nine Gentile deputies to 11 "Mormon" deputies, which is certainly a very fair division, and no complaint has been made on that account by Gentiles.

BASED ON FALSEHOODS.

It will be seen by the foregoing that every reason given by my Gentile friends for voting the "American Party" ticket was based upon either a lack of information or upon wrong information regarding the real facts. It is a well known fact that the "Mormon" Church has been trying to take the politics of Utah, in favor of the "Mormons" and against the Gentiles, all thinking persons must agree that it has not succeeded very well. Such a claim is not well founded. There is no just cause for complaint. The Republican party is big enough and broad enough to deal fairly with all of the citizens of Utah, regardless of the question to what church a man belongs.

Every good citizen of Utah should assist in keeping out of the politics of Utah the old animosity of the past. I for one do not care to return to the old days of bitterness and strife. If there were any just grounds for complaint I believe I would be one of the first to protest against Church interference. I believe that all of the good citizens of Utah, and I mean all of the Republicans and Democrats, love the American flag as well as the "American Party" leaders profess to.

ITS REAL OBJECT.

The "American Party" was organized for the especial purpose of defeating the old animosity of the past, and if only partially successful, it will mean the end of the old animosity, old strife and old heart burnings will be brought back again; and I implore all good citizens to settle this question now, once for all, by voting the Republican ticket.

A vote for the "American Party" ticket is half a vote for the Democratic ticket with the inevitable result that the personal animosities of the past will be again revived and reshaped to the great detriment of the growth of the State of Utah, and to the great detriment of the business interests of the city of Salt Lake.

THEIR FACES TO THE WALL.

Masked Robber Lines Up Six Men in a Saloon.

Redding, Cal., Nov. 4.—A masked man armed with a pistol entered Carter's saloon at Cottonwood this morning and lined up six men with their faces to the wall and their hands over their heads, while he relieved them of \$500 in cash and \$1,500 in checks. As he left the saloon the robber facetiously remarked: "I hope you boys make a winning tonight."

Charles Emerson, one of the men who was held up, has been arrested by the town constable, who says Emerson falsely told him there was a fight across the street in order to get him out of the way. Emerson, it is charged, then signaled his partner, A. Redding, who is suspected of doing the actual hold up work.

A DEADLY RIOT NEAR ROCHESTER.

One Man is Dead and Three Probably Are Fatally Injured.

ITALIANS ATTACKED FOREMAN.

He Ordered Them Into a Swamp—They Demurred—He Insisted—Then Trouble Began.

Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 4.—One man was killed and three probably fatally injured in a riot near here today. A man named Dean, foreman of a construction gang for a trolley company, ordered his men, all Italians, to get into a swamp. They refused because they had no high boots. Dean insisted. This angered the men, who attacked him with knives. Dean began shooting at the men. One Italian was instantly killed, another fatally wounded, and it is said there is another dead Italian in the swamp. Dean, it is said, cannot live.

ROJESTVENSKY.

He Pays a Round of Visits at Tangier.

Tangier, Nov. 4.—Vice Admiral Rojestvensky paid a round of visits this morning. He called on the commander of the French cruiser Kleber, on the commander of the British cruiser Diana and on Mohammed El Torres, the representative at Tangier of the sultan of Morocco. The usual salutes were fired. Mohammed El Torres returned the admiral's call at the Russian legation.

EXCAVATIONS AT BISMAYA.

American Legation Seeking Permission to Resume Them.

Constantinople, Nov. 4.—The American legation is now seeking permission from the Turkish government for the resumption of the excavations conducted by Dr. E. A. Banks, director of the University of Chicago expedition to Babylon at Bismaya, Mesopotamia, which were suspended pending an investigation made in the presence of American Vice Consul Turner at Baghdad of charges of complicity on the part of Dr. Banks in the alleged disappearance of valuable antiquities. These charges were proved to be utterly without foundation.

BRITISH COLLIERIES.

Not Permitted to Follow Russian Fleet With Coal.

London, Nov. 4.—Foreign Secretary Lansdowne in a letter dated Nov. 3, has informed a British ship owning firm that "it is not permissible for British owners to charter their vessels for the purpose of following the Russian fleet with coal." The letter was in reply to a direct query from the firm, which drew the attention of the foreign office to the British collier Roddam, which was then lying at Vigo awaiting the arrival of the Russian squadron and asked if British owners were entitled to charter their vessels for this purpose.

Parker Returns to New York.

New York, Nov. 4.—Judge Parker returned to New York today from his Connecticut tour. At the Union station in Hartford a large crowd gathered to bid him farewell and there were a number of receptions at stations through which the judge passed coming to New York. Judge Parker will spend the day at the hotel receiving political friends and advisers.

The College Woman.

St. Louis, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Warren Cheney, of the University of California, read a paper on "Will Nature Eliminate The College Woman?" before the Association of Collegiate Alumni at its session at the World's fair today.

JOHN MORLEY ON GREATNESS OF UNITED STATES.

Pittsburg, Nov. 3.—John Morley, the famous historian and leader, made the principal address at the annual Founders' day of the Carnegie Institute. Referring to the vast immigration to this country, he said:

"The persevering absorption and incorporation of these elements into one stable, industrious and pacific state is an achievement that neither the Roman church, neither Byzantine empire nor Russian nor Chinese the Great nor Charles the Fifth, nor Napoleon ever rivaled or approached."

After referring to the growth of the English-speaking peoples and the probability that before the end of the century they will compose four-fifths of the human race, Mr. Morley touched on the growth of liberalism, which he considered in many parts of the world synonymous with progress and spoke of the number of political and social revolutions due to it.

The awards of the international art jury were as follows: First prize, "Across the River," by W. E. Scofield, painting, gold medal and cash award of \$1,500.

Second prize, "A Rehearsal in the Studio," by Edmund C. Tarbell, silver medal and cash award of \$1,000.

Third prize, "White and Gold," by Howard G. Cushing, bronze medal and cash award of \$500.

PREMIER LAURIER WINS A VICTORY.

The Liberal Government is Returned to Power in Canada.

WITH INCREASED MAJORITY.

Opposition Organ Concedes Fifty-Nine—Sir Wilfrid's Chief Opponent Defeated.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 4.—With six more elections to be held, the result of yesterday's contest shows the Liberals returned to power with a greater majority than ever. The Globe claims a majority of 66 for the government, which it predicts will be increased to 70.

The Mail and Empire, the opposition organ, concedes 59 with one independent. The majority at dissolution was 54. The most remarkable feature of the contest was the defeat of Borden, the Conservative leader, in his own city of Halifax and the failure of the Conservatives of Nova Scotia to return a single member. His failure to carry a single seat in his own province may mean his retirement to private life.

The government's new transcontinental railway scheme has been strongly endorsed by the west, the northwest territories returning nine straight supporters of the government, while all the elections so far held in British Columbia were favorable to the Liberals. One significant feature was the defeat in Quebec of Chase Chagnon, who inspired the campaign against Laurier, because he had granted England a preference.

NEWFOUNDLAND ELECTION.

St. John's, N. F., Nov. 4.—Completed returns from Newfoundland show the election of Premier Sir Robert Bond, Surveyor-General Cliff and Mr. Roberts, Liberals, defeating Alan Goodridge, Donald Morison and Frederick News, oppositionists. Mr. Morison is a former judge of the supreme court. He defeated two years ago to re-enter politics and advocate the union of Newfoundland with Canada. Mr. Morison is grand master of the Orange association in Newfoundland, and is one of the five Tory leaders opposing Premier Bond. This defeat is a significant one, because Mr. Morison was only five years ago the colleague of Mr. Goodridge, heading him. The government now has 25 seats and the opposition five.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 4.—There is no very material change in the standing of parties in yesterday's contest. In Ontario there are some constituencies in doubt, but the result will probably be: Liberals, 143; Conservatives, 71. This is a house of 214 members. The majorities for the Liberals are large in Quebec and in most cases the majorities for both parties were small in Ontario. Six elections have yet to be held. They were Liberal in the last parliament.

CHINAMAN MURDERED.

In Ante Mortem Statement Says Woman Assaulted Him.

New York, Nov. 4.—Wo Kee, a Chinese laundryman, is dead from nine terrible wounds on his head and face, received during a fight today in his laundry with a white woman companion. The woman, who says she is Mollie Donovan, 23 years old, of Philadelphia, is in a dangerous condition in a hospital, from several deep cuts in her head and shoulders, and is a prisoner, on the charge of causing the Chinaman's death.

Wo Kee, in a statement before he died, said that the woman assaulted him with a cleaver while he was asleep, and claimed that he inflicted her wounds in defending himself. A policeman, attracted to the laundry by the calls of the woman for help, said the place resembled a shambly. Both Wo Kee and Mollie Donovan were taken to a hospital and there the Chinaman died soon after telling his story of the affair.

ALMA STEINIGWEG MURDER.

No Light Whatever is Thrown on The Mystery.

Cincinnati, Nov. 4.—The only possible clue to the murder of Alma Steinigweg, the telephone operator whose body was found yesterday near Spring Grove cemetery, was furnished today by Frank Linn, conductor of the car on which the girl rode home on Wednesday, the last time she was seen alive. Linn says that a short stout man boarded the car with Miss Steinigweg on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday nights, alighting when she did. On Monday and Tuesday nights other passengers alighted at the same time, but on Wednesday night the girl and the stranger were the only persons to get off the car at the cemetery. A saloon keeper near the scene says he saw a man of this description later Wednesday night, but no trace of the man has been found, nor any clue to his identity.

JAPAN'S CHARGES.

Lamsdorff Den
