Dentistry in Brazil.

Consul-General G. E. Anderson, of Rio de Janeiro, is receiving many American inquiries concerning openings in Brazil for the practice of dentistry, to which he replies:

In Rio de Janeiro there are quite a large number of Brazilian dentists, and others are not. There are also a number of American dentists who have plenty of work at high prices, and while the cost of living and their expenses are very high, they have large incomes. The advertised prices are 30 to 50 milreis per hour (\$10 to \$16 gold), the actual charges being a little below these rates. These successful dentists, however, are men of experience and attainments and would do well anywhere. To secure a license one must pass not only a rigid technical examination, but must read and write Portuguese fluently. The Brazilian who can supply first class practice are limited in number and the trade is well controlled, so that it would be difficult for new dentists to secure an opening. American dental supplies are popular and well represented here.
