CORRESPONDENCE.

THAT SANPETE HOMICIDE.

PARTICULARS OF THE KILLING OF SOREN CHRISTENSEN—MISTAKEN FOR A DEER—SEVEN LITTLE CHILDREN ORPHANED.

MORONI, Utah,
October 14, 1885.

Editor Deseret News:

Soren Christensen, (Dane,) of this place, was shot and instantly killed in the mountains west of here, yesterday, while out hunting deer.

A party, consisting of Martin, Chris. and "Dolph" Taylor, the deceased and Amos Bradley, had been out for several days. All but "Dolph" had camped together the previous night; he, having become lost, and not arriving, the party scattered next morning to seek him, soon after which he made his way to camp, and meeting Amos Bradley, the two went to find the other members of the party.

They had gone but a short distance when Taylor thought he saw a deer moving in the thick brush about a hundred yards ahead, he immediately took aim and fired. The two circled off in different directions, to head off the supposed game, for which they hunted some fifteen minutes, when they found Christensen in the place where Taylor thought he had seen the deer. The ball entered below the right ear and came out at the upper part of the left side of the head, scattering the brains in all directions.

Taylor is filled with horror and remorse at having unintentionally slain his friend, between himself and whom the warmest ties of friendship existed. An inquest was held before the justice of the precinct, at which a verdict in accordance with the foregoing facts was rendered.

Christensen's wife died quite unexpectedly on the 15th of October 1884, leaving seven helpless children to be cared for, the condition of whom seems doubly hard to be thus deprived, within one short year, of both their earthly parents. Their helpless condition excites the warmest sympathies of their many friends.

The funeral took place to-day, and was attended by a very large concourse of people, who all manifested their deep sorrow and strong sympathy for the bereaved.

AN IMPUTATION DENIED.

Death of Hogs Not Due to Feeding Sorghum Seed.

SALT LAKE CITY,
October 15th, 1885.

Editor Deseret News:

I noticed in a paper called the *Sugar Beet* an article on the subject of Sorghum Sugar, in which the idea was conveyed that the death of a number of hogs which were being fed at the large Sorghum Sugar Factory in New Jersey, was attributable to the feeding of them on cane seed, and being anxious to be thoroughly posted on everything affecting this interest I wrote on the subject to the Agricultural Department at Washington and obtained the accompanying reply, which I offer for your notice, and which you will see is conclusive.

As a large proportion of the profitable features of the business consists in the feeding of pork on the cane seed, and as the amount of cane necessary to produce our sugar would yield also a sufficient quantity of seed to make all our bacon for which we now pay \$400,000 annually, you will at once perceive the importance of this question.

Mr. Arthur Stayner, Salt Lake City, Utah:

Sir:—Your letter of the 2nd ultimo, to the Commissioner of Agriculture, inquiring as to the cause of the death of the hogs at the Rio Grande Sugar Works, of New Jersey, was duly received, and has been referred to me for answer.

I am informed by the Secretary of the State Board of Health of New Jersey, that he made a personal investigation of the disease from which these hogs died, and is satisfied that it had no connection with the mode of feeding, but resulted from hog-cholera, which was introduced by the purchase of an infected animal.
