SLAVERY IN WEST VIRGINIA.

A German Doctor, his Experience in the South.

New York, Oct. 19.—There is today a man living at 75 Bartlett Street, Brooklyn, whose frame is emaciated, whose feet and legs are weak and swollen, whose hands tremble with palsy and whose eyes and face have that strained and tired look which is the result of long and terrible suffering.

His name is Jacob Metcalf, his age 45, and he is a German by birth. He has been in America a year and five months. His wife and two sons live with him on the fourth floor of the Bartlett Street house, and his neighbors and fellow laborers speak well of him and have shown that they believe in his honesty.

THE STORY OF HIS TERRIBLE WOUNDS.

He says he was engaged to go to West Virginia with forty-five others, where employment at \$1.75 a day was to be given them out of the railroad. From the time of leaving Brooklyn until he can away his experience was one of constant suffering. Ration food was served the men. No money was paid them and payment of a week's wages was withheld upon the slightest provocation. If food was withheld, the men were made to leave the camp.

One Saturday night Metcalf and three others managed to slip away. All that night and part of next day they walked, lost sleep and hunger. They were then taken to a place where they were to be employed. Just as they were congratulating themselves upon their escape, they were taken back over the seven miles they had just traversed. When they reached camp, more food was withheld, and they were taken sick with fever. They were compelled to work, however, and were punished for being sick. Finally Metcalf made his escape and by traveling at night and hiding at day, and living on wild fruit, he reached Richmond, where friends supplied him with money to reach home. He is in a nervous condition, but, says Metcalf, the others are still in West Virginia at work under armed guard.

HEROIC WOMAN.

She Risked a Vessel to the Harbor, and Her Heroic Deeds.
