#### HUGH MEYERS IS FREE.

Justice Bishon Holds Evidence in Murder Case Insufficient.

Hugh Meyers, the young cripple held for complicity in the murder of John C. Barnett, was discharged from custody yesterday afternoon after a preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace F. M. Bishop.

Barnett was found murdered in a room at the American House in Com-mercial street on the morning of March 4. Meyers was arrested later in the day, suspicion being directed against him because of the fact that his crutch was not blood-stained but that it fitted into the wounds upon the murdered man's face and hands, leading to the belief that the crutch had been used as the death-instrument. Meyers had occupied a cot in the hallway near the room where the murder was committed and a colored woman, Flo Richardson, made a statement to the police before her death a week following the mur-der, that she had seen Meyers enter

der, that she had seen Meyers enter the room occupied by Barnett. Meyers was charged with murder in the first degree upon the recommenda-tion of the coronet's jury which sat upon the murder, but the evidence in-troduced at the preliminary hearing yesterday was not considered by Jus-tice Bishop sufficient to warrant Mey-ers being bound over to the district court, and he was discharged. court, and he was discharged.
