What is Revelation - Gift of the Holy Ghost - People of God Led by Inspiration - Experience of all Elders - Power of Ordination - Succession in the Presidency - Revelation to Lead the Church - Right of the Saints to the Guidance of the Spirit of God - Assurance of Revelation - Interesting Personal Incidents.

I have no doubt that we all have listened with great interest to the remarks of our brethren this afternoon. such experiences as they have related are beneficial to the people in strengthening their faith and giving them additional evidences of the truth of the Gospel and of the power of God which is being manifested in these days.

While Brother Pond was speaking about the influence of the Spirit some thoughts passed through my mind that I would like to express. The Latterday Saints talk a great deal about the Spirit of God, the Holy Ghost, and the principle of revelation, and a great many wonder what it means. What is there about the "Mormon" people to convince others that they really are led by the Holy Ghost?

WHAT IS REVELATION.

There is a passage in one of the revelations which the Lord gave to the Prophet Joseph Smith before this Church was organized, that explains to some extent the nature of the Spirit by which this people have been and are led. It is in a revelation given through the Prophet to Oliver Cowdery in relathe translation of old records. The Lord said:

"Yea, behold, I will tell you in your mind and in your heart, by the Holy Ghost, which shall come upon you and which shall dwell in your heart.

Now, behold, this is the Spirit of revelation; behold, this is the Spirit by which Moses brought the children of Israel through the Red Sea on dry ground

We have heard this afternoon how the Spirit of God directs the Elders of this Church and prompts them what to do. In this manner the Church has been built up from the beginning. Every Elder that has gone forth has had a claim upon the spirit of revelation. But a great many people have imagined that when the Holy Ghost descended apon men or women they were completely transformed, and that it was a supernatural influence which could be witnessed and felt by those surrounding the person receiving it. On this ac many misapprehensions have arisen in regard to the way this Church has been governed. Some members of the Church have imagined that it has been necessary for angels to come and point out to the leaders of the people every step they should take, or that some other supernatural power had to be exhibited to enable the servants of God to do as they have done in leading the people

GIFT OF THE HOLY GHOST.

But there is a higher gift than the gift of angels, and that

instance where a faithful man thus ap-pointed ever found himself lacking in the performance of his duties? No: I am sure the universal testimony would be, if called for, that every man thus ointed and set apart has been made capable of filling his office and calling to the acceptance of the Lord, to the satisfaction of his brethren, and to his own happiness. When "residents of conferences are appointed the same spirit and power follows them.

We see the same effect at home. Let a man be ordained to the office of a Bishop, or a Bishop's counselor, or a High Counselor, and in every instance, if he be a faithful man, the spirit, pow-er and gifts of his office will rest upon him. He will be filled with the same spirit which inspires the Prophet of God and those associated with him So with an Apostle. Let the Lord select a man out of the body of the people and make him an

Apostle, and what a change takes place! The spirit of the Apostleship rests upon him; the gifts of that Priesthood and calling descend upon him, and he becomes a changed man in consequence of the bestowal of those powers upon him. He receives au-thority; he enjoys the spirit of revelation; he is upheld by the people as a Prophet, Seer and Revelator. If he be a faithful man, he receives the gift and power of a Prophet and a Revelator, and perhaps of a Seer. These are his rights, because he has

been ordained to that office; and God has promised that if men will serve and obey Him in all things, He will give them the necessary power and gifts.

SUCCESSION IN THE PRESIDENCY. While the Prophet Joseph Smith

lived no one supposed that any other man could be found who would have power to lead the Church. The great The great bulk of the Church believed he would live till Jesus should come, and when was martyred every heart was ed with sorrow. Who could take filled with sorrow. Who could take his place? Who could hold the keys? Who could lead the people? Confu-sion to a certain extent reigned in the midst of the people. But all the keys and authority which Joseph had received from various angels, he had conferred upon others before his death, These men held the same authority, therefore, that the Prophet did; but because it was not necessary for them to exercise it, they did not appear to possess it. After Joseph was killed, and the occasion arose, then the man who held the keys, he being the senior Apostle and the one who presided over the quorum of the Twelve, arose, filled with the same power, and with the

same gifts-at least, with a great many of them. Men vary in their or-ganizations. Joseph possessed gifts that no man in this age possessed. Brigham Young, having a different organization, had gifts which the Prophet Joseph did not have, and he arose in power of his Priesthood and calling, with the authority to stand, as the senior Apostle, at the head of the Church and to declare the word of God to the people. When he appeared before the people they could see that he pos-sessed the authority and the power. the pe And the Twelve were with him. The revelation says that the Twelve are "equal in authority and power to the three Presidents," and the Severty "form a quorum equal in authority to that of the Twelve." But the Twelve are equal to the First Presidency only when the First Presidency are absent; and if the First Presidency and Twelve were absent, the Seventy would be equal. At the time I am speaking of, the First Presidency were absent. Joseph had been slain; one of his ounselors had apostatized, and the other was not as he should be. Thereore, there was no First Presidency. It fell then to the quorum of the Twelve to preside; for they held the authority equal to the First Presidency, and the First Presidency were absent. The quorum of the Twelve has no right to pre-side when the First Presidency is there. Brigham Young stepped forward with the Twelve and took the presidency of the Church. And through his unwill-ingness to push himself forward, the Twelve governed the Church for three years. But the Church is not perfectly rganized unless there is a First Pres. dency, and a Twelve, and a Seventy. Now, every one of the Twelve held the Now. same powers as the Prophet Joseph, but they had no right to exercise them only in their own place and station. No one of them could rise up and exercise the authority of leading the Church. As the Lord has plainly revealed, there is only one man on earth at a time who has the right to hold the keys and to preside, though others may have equal power, authority and ordination, and be equal in every other respect. Only one man is caled to lead. There were twelve men with Brigham, but Brigham held the keys. He was the sentor Apostle tle, and had the right to exercise that authority. When the First Pres-idency was organized he still, with his counselors, had the right to preside over the Church. I mention these things to show you that there is a power attending ordination and setting apart. We can see it from the head of the Church to the last man ordained to the Priesthood, every man in his cailing, according to his faithfulness and the Priesthood that he holds, and all having a claim on the

The sending of missionaries abroad, the spirit of this undertaking rests upon the man who presides, and he has the right to say what course shall be taken If a move is made he has the right to say whether it is right or wrong. If it is right, the Spirit of God makes it plain to him, and he sees it just as plain to him, and he sees it just as clearly as I see this path in the center of this building. If it is wrong, every-thing is dark, obstacles appear in the way, and he is made to know that it is not the right move to take. As I have said, there is but one man who has this right. If it were otherwise, confusion would ensue. No limit is placed upon the ex-pression of views concerning all questions affecting the policy of the Church but there must be union of action and concentration of faith and obedience to the law which God has revealed.

RIGHT TO THE GUIDANCE OF THE SPIRIT OF GOD.

My brethren and sisters, in the small-My brethren and sisters, in the small-est details of life it is your privilege to have the guidance of the Spirit of God. When anything be, comes perfectly clear to your mind, after you have sought the Lord concerning it, you may know that that is right; but if it be dark, let me admonish you not to follow it, because the Spirit of God is not there. If Moses had not followed the light which God revealed to him when he led which God revealed to him when he led the children of Israel, disaster would have followed. If he himself had thought any other direction better than the one pointed out by the Spirit, would have done wrong in following it. But Moses followed the course revealed to him by the Spirit of the Lord, and he led the people with perfect assurance as to the result.

ASSURANCE OF REVELATION.

How the possession of this gift relieves the man of God! What an ap-pailing responsibility it would have been for President Young to have led the Latter-day Saints into the wilder-ness if he had not had this spirit of revelation with him! Think of thousands of people following him, taking his advice and counsel, and he uncertain as to what to do! No: Brigham was never uncertain. A faithful Prophet of God is never uncertain. He is not as-sailed by doubts. Everything he does is decisive, because he knows what he is doing is right. The sense of responsibility is taken from him to that extent. So it has been in every move that has been made. As a people we have done most daring things—things which have startled the world. Why? Because the man at the head has known the mind of the Lord. He has known the voice of the Spirit of God, and has given heed to its monitions. In doing so he has felt perfectly safe in whatever action he has been ied to take, knowing that the Lord would control it for good. eves mechanically follow the multiplici-ty of signs and posters that adorn the walls, the outside of the counters, and

This has been the course taken in this Church from the beginning. The Elders who have gone on missions have with all the gay calendars, posters and learned this to a great extent. The experience of the Latter-day Saints is replete with instances of the wonderful manner in which they have been led and delivered, and it has been because of this great gift which God has bestowed upon His servants and apon all who have bowed in submission to Hin will When the people of God first came to

This has been my experience in all my missionary labors. On every mission I have taken I have followed the lead of the Spirit; and at times when great responsibility arose and something decisive had to be done,

a "dug out" on a mammoth scale, known as the Ajax Store, carrying a large stock of general merchandise; its dimensions, 100x80 fect-in some parts of the huge excavation, the depth must be about 20 feet from the surface -the heavy dirt roof, supported by strong timbers, planned and blaced as the miner would timber up a tunnel in a mine.

This great "dug out" is lighted in a peculiar way. One part of the roof falls away to the south about four feet, like a fault in a mine. Here the builder has put in a row of windows which receive the light from the south, and the great cave below is wonderfully well lighted in every part from these windows, which are more than twenty

feet above the floor. This cave or mammoth "dug out" is the work of a Welsh miner, named William Ajax, who came here some twenty-five years ago, engleed by rich meadows in the vicioity. which vielded him a splendid revenue from the hay, which he sold at the mining town of Ophic, but with the appropriation of the waters by settlers of the creek above, these once rich meadows are now as dry and barren as the rest of the sun burnt acres that extend for miles in every direction. William Ajax, who died lest fall, was

a man of considerable culture and edu-cation; peculiar and somewhat ecceltric, although he with his family have lived in a "dug out" all these years, the family have received a liberal education which makes their society a bloasure.

This huge hole in the ground was once but large enough to accommodate the family as a residence, but it has been enlarged from time to thus unti it has reached its present Are, oil the dirt, it is said, of this excavasion, was removed by Mr. Ajax with a wheel harrow; he would work at his task long in the night as though possessed of the nocturnal propensities of other burrow.

ing animals. The earth has been remeved to the west of the excavation and forms the large mound upon which the stables and sheds now stand. There is a method in arranging the earth of the mound It forms a great saucer, like we find at the Sait Palace. The sheds and stables are built on the upper edge, al-lowing all moisture to drain to the bottom or center. Here, in the construction of the sta-

bles, as in the store, all the packing cases that ever came to the stabilshbles, inset that ever table to the eriability-ment have been utilized, every half has assisted in nailing to the sides of the stables the pleces which (hev once held together, in the form of boxes. Store, stables, and corral are beculiar and unique in their construction, and the order on ordinate the part

The owner of the store was a shrewd business man, and kept a well assorted stock of merchandise on hand and his wares commanded a good price on account of the unique and ischated loca-tion of this underground metcantile establishment, in days past before the meadow became barren a few settlers lived in the vicinity of the store, but now it alone remains, and from whom the store obtains its patropage today is past finding out.
