Honored Pioncer Lays Down Life's Cares on 60th Birthday Anniversary. Special Correspondence.

Mt. Pleasant, Sanpete Co., Nov. 13 --Mt. Pleasant, campete Co., Nov. 13.--peter Syndergaard, one of the pioncers of this valley, departed this life on Monday morning, Nov. 13, at his home, two miles north of this city, from an attack of heart disease. The day of his death was the sixtieth anniversary of death was the ended anniversary of his birth. Elder Syndergaard was born in Denmark in 1845. While a young man he embraced the religion of the Latter-day Saints, and, with his write, emigrated to Utah in 1862, setting in y. Pleasant, where the family version amigrated to Utah in 1862, settling in Mt. Pleasant, where the family resided for 10 years. They then sold their be-longings and moved to Wales, where they resided 20 years. Three years ago they sold out in Wales and came back to Mt. Pleasant, purchasing one of the best farms on what is Known as Birch reek, where they have lived comfort-ably ever since. He was a steady, well balanced man, a model farmer and a true and faithful member of the Churca. He has reared a large family, and He has reared a large family, and reared them well, being the father of 15 children, 12 of whom survive himsons and six daughters. He was by no means a stranger to the trials and hardships incident to the early settle-ment of this valley, and the part he has taken has been in every sense a heroic
