Tonight the patrons of the Salt Palace bicycle track will witness the best program that has ever yet been placed on the boards and there is little doubt that the crowd tonight will be one of the largest ever gathered at this popular sport. The sign "All Passes Suspended" will be hung out and every person who passes through the gates this evening will have a ticket that has been paid for in real money. Every cent of money taken in for this evening's meet will be turned over to the Hopper fund, treasurer of the benefit fund, who will on Wednesday deliver the amount to Hopper. The track lights, officials, advertising and riders' services have all been donated, which makes it possible for all the money to go to the aid of the injured rider.

The riders themselves declare that the public will see better riding tonight than ever before. Men who have during the season been doing team work will do it alone this evening and every man out for himself, and each going in the race with the intention of winning. The

racers will be hot from start to finish. Every second of the time will witness an exciting race. It is expected that early in the evening it will be necessary to begin placing the crowd in the arena. For this reason the motor event, a match race between Samuelson and Whittier, will be the first number on the program, as it will not be safe for motor races with a big crowd in the center of the track.

One of the several good features of the program for the evening will be the Australian pursuit race between the American and foreign teams. It will be the first big event of its kind pulled off in Salt Lake City. An effort will be made during the evening to lower the time on the Hopper record mile. The professional three-quarter-mile handicap will be a sprint from the time the gun is fired until the tape has been passed, and the two-mile lap professional will be a hummer.

The amateurs will also be seen on the track and will try for the western mile championship. Every amateur on the track will get out and go, and the winner carries away a title. The first long handicap amateur for the season will be seen tonight. All the way through the meet tonight will be the best that has ever yet been arranged on the Salt Palace track. Every rider at the track has not only donated his services for tonight but has also been working during his spare moments for the past two weeks to make the event a success. It is the public's turn tonight to know that they, too, are in the spirit and turn out in full numbers.

SHAMROCK WINS CUP IN LIPTON YACHT RACE

New York, July 21.—Fredrick Thompson's schooner yacht Shamrock has been officially declared the winner of the Lipton cup, the principal prize in the Cape May race of the Brooklyn Yacht club.

This decision has been delayed owing to a protest of Stuyvesant Wainwright, owner of the ship Mimosa III, second in the race, against the Shamrock. The Shamrock was announced by the committee before the start of the contest.

That there should be no further trouble in the matter, the regatta committee of the club, at the request of all the parties interested, asked Prof. William Hallock, manager of the New York Yacht club, to re-measure the Shamrock. He did so last week, and the new rating of the craft, as given by Prof. Hallock is 5.57, which is lower than the original rating which was 5.75. These figures give the Shamrock plenty to spare in corrected time over the second boat and the committee finds in her favor.

MRS. LESLIE CARTER IS WITHOUT FUNDS

ATHLETIC TRAINING SAVED A CHILD'S LIFE

New York, July 21.—Athletic training which 3-months-old Helen Graf had received from her father, saved the baby's life when she fell from the fifth floor of her home. The baby caught and held to the fire escape two stories below. Joseph Graf, the child's father, is a foreman in a machine shop and an athlete of repute. He has three children, of whom Helen is the youngest. Graf had taught her to hold on to a broomstick while he lifted her from her cradle and carried her around the room. In this way the baby's muscles became hardened.

When Graf was on the fire escape yesterday hanging out clothes and did not notice the baby climb out after her, she took a good look at the child as she fell through the hole of the fire escape. Mrs. Graf fainting on the fourth floor the falling child struck the rail of the fire escape and in that manner was thrown outside of the escape. By a chance the child as she passed the third floor fire escape brushed the rail so close that her fingers always on the stier from her broomstick training caught the iron bar and held on.

In the yard below was Joseph Colombo, 14 years old, who saw the scene and baby and climbed up the ladder and took the child off.

INSANE PATIENTS.

Experiment to be Made to Teach Them Kindergarten Subjects.

Chicago, July 21.—Treatment of patients at the Dunning asylum for the insane instead of merely holding them in custody is a new departure to be launched today by a class of 25 hospital attendants which has been studying at the Chicago school of civics and philanthropy. Miss Julia Lathrop, one of the directors of the school, believes that insane have the mentality of children in different stages of development, and that it may be stimulated by teaching such subjects as are taught in kindergartens.
