LOCAL BRIEFS.

This is pay day at Fort Douglas.

State Engineer Tanner has gone to El Paso in attendance on the meeting there.

Five new Elks will be made at tonight's brew of the noble order, at the State street corral.

A prominent Los Angeles gentleman named Pomroy is at the Kenyon hotel, with the intention of investing in Salt Lake realty.

Dean Monahan of the Bell Telephone company in this city has been made assistant manager of the exchange at Bingham Junction.

Local contractors consider the chances for the winter as unusually good in the building line for this city, both in the way of residence and business properties.

This afternoon Miss Martha Johnson, supervisor of physical culture, will lecture to the teachers of the seventh grade on physical culture work. She met with the teachers of the sixth grade yesterday.

Councilman C. M. Neuhausen is barely holding his own, in typhoid fever. One day he is up and the next day down. Monday he had a hard time of it, and the sufferer's strength seems to be wasting away.

Manager H. G. Williams of the Utah Fuel company says that the work of reconstruction of the burned coal breakers is progressing so rapidly that it will not be long before the entire works are running in full as before the fire.

The land office and the office of the surveyor general are expected to receive orders to "remove at once" from the Templeton, where they have been for so many years, to their new and permanent quarters in the Federal building.

The room on the fourth floor of the city and county building used by the lower house during the sessions of the Legislature has been converted into a room for the holding of teachers' meetings and will be used for that purpose excepting during the time the Legislature is in session.

The Bishop of the diocese has a long and complimentary notice of the recent visitation there of Bishop Scannell of the Catholic church, and of the elaborate confirmation services held last Sunday in St. Patrick's church. The musical features were particularly noteworthy. The bishop preached in the evening.

Proprietor G. S. Holmes of the Knutsford remarked last evening that he had invested large sums of money in Salt Lake, and believes he has done a wise thing. He says the signs of the times indicate a solid and substantial growth for the town, and that no other place in the west offers so excellent opportunities for investment.

Rev. Dr. David Utter of the Church of the United in Denver, and Rev. Frank Fay Eddy of this city, will exchange pulpits on the last Sunday in the month. Dr. Utter was the first pastor in the Unitarian church Salt Lake ever had, and has many well-remembered here. He will also lecture on the evening of the 25th inst. on Emerson and his friends, before the Unitarian club.

The continued dry weather has resulted in the air of the valley being filled with alkali dust, the constant breathing of which causes irritation of the mucous membranes of the nasal passages and the throat, producing catarrhal coats. Parties who are up on the foothills and mountains during the day, report that the entire valley and lake is enveloped in a heavy cloud of dust, mist and haze.

The Calvary Baptist church (colored) of this city will hold special services next Sunday, when visiting clergymen will be present. In addition to the morning service, there will be a special service in Odd Fellows' hall at 2 p. m., when Rev. R. S. Walker of the East side Baptist church will speak; and at 7:30 p. m., a service song, and speeches will be held, with the sermon from Rev. D. A. Brown of the First Baptist church.

The state board of regents met yesterday afternoon to open bids for the construction of a hydraulic laboratory to cost about \$15,000, as provided for by the last Legislature, and referred the bids to the appropriate committee for examination and report. The laboratory will be erected on the north side of the physical building, and be equipped with all the latest appliances for instruction in hydraulics and hydraulic engineering.

Captain G. A. Hammond of the reclamation bureau reports work on the Milk river reservoir in Montana as stopped on account of international complications. The river rises in Montana, runs over into the Dominion for a short distance and then back into Montana again. The damming of the river at St. Mary's lake will interfere with the use of that part of the stream running through Canada, hence a good sized trail from the inhabitants thereof.

General Agent S. J. Seal of the International Harvester company of Chicago, has returned from a Boise business trip. He says the prosperity of southern Idaho is something remarkable, and settlers are pouring all the time into the state. Land between Boise and Nampa is selling at \$100 to \$125 and \$150, and the price of grain is going higher, and there seems to be no end to the growth and development. Mr. Seal considers the outlook for the coming year as of the brightest.

STRANGE STORY OF THEFT.

Park City Woman Says She Was Robbed of \$1,000.

A woman who says her name is Mrs. Laura Brooks, from Park City, approached Officer Purser on Second South street last night and told a sensational tale of having been robbed of a purse containing the sum of \$1,000.

The woman says she was in company with a girl companion and was on West Temple street about 8 o'clock when a man suddenly grabbed her handbag and then thrust it again in her face. She said that she was so frightened that she did not see which way the man ran, but that she escaped with the money.

Mrs. Brooks said that within half an hour she was going to England; that she had \$1,000 which was kept for her by a man who was at the White House. She got the money, so she says, from the man yesterday.

Detectives questioned her, but she refused to tell where she got the money or who her lady companion was.

After telling her weird story she said she was going to her room at the Antler house. Later she asked a reporter to call at her room in the White House, but she could not be found either there or at the Antler.

From her description of the handbag the officers say they do not believe she had that much money in it, as she said half of the sum was in bills and the other half in gold.

MAN SHOT BY BOYS.
Slightly Wounded as a Result of Revolver Accidentally Discharged.

William Grimsdell, of 753 east Fourth South street, was shot in the back last night by two boys named Robert Hilderbrand, aged 13 years, and Valdemar Fogel, aged 14 years. The shot was fired accidentally. The youngsters were playing with a small revolver in a ditch in front of Grimsdell's house, when Mr. Grimsdell and his wife entered the front yard. Suddenly a shot was fired, and Mr. Grimsdell felt a stinging sensation in his back between the shoulders.

Mr. Grimsdell turned around and saw the boys running away. He went into the house and removed his coat and found that the wound was bleeding slightly.

Dr. Bower was called in but was unable to locate the bullet. The wound is not considered at all dangerous.

Mr. Grimsdell went to Mr. Grimsdell's house, Hilderbrand had the revolver and Fogel asked him for it. As the weapon was passed from one to the other, it was accidentally discharged.

The boys were taken to the police station, but were soon released.

1609-Johann Kepler, the astronomer, died; born 1571.

1726-Baron Steuben, born in Magdeburg, Prussia; died 1794.

1788-Sir William Herschel, the astronomer and scientist, born; died 1822. The great astronomer pursued the study of science under the greatest difficulties. While an organist, he had to conceal his first reflecting telescope, and also while there maintained instruction in order to all that had preceded him in point of magnifying and illuminating power. He began studying the stars with a telescope magnifying 22 times. His most celebrated instrument was the 4-foot reflecting telescope, which at a speculum of which was 4 feet in diameter, 35 inches thick and over 2,000 pounds in weight.

1867-Mme. Verdi, for 50 years the consort of the famous composer, died at Rome.

1901-Dr. Albert Leary Gibson, commodore U. S. N., retired, formerly medical director of the navy and a writer of medical works, died in New York city; born 1852.

1904-Freda Fuchsmilch of Japan greeted President Roosevelt in the name of the mikado.
