INTERESTING LIGHT FIGHT.

Ariel Cardon Made Superintendent of City Schools—W. Peterson's Sad Death.

INTERESTING LIGHT FIGHT.

ADJUST SCHOOL DIFFICULTY

And Eighth grade Students Get Credit—School Election—Success of Dry Farms.

Nephi, Utah, July 20.—Supt. A. C. Nelson and the clerk of the state board of education, Mr. Matthews, came to Nephi Monday and adjusted the difficulties between the school board and the county examining board.

The papers had been marked by a board of examiners, and the school board, pointed by Supt. Nelson, and they reported their mark to be lower than those made by the board of examiners, proving the charges of dishonesty made by the eighth grade class and others to be groundless.

The class record could not be considered owing to its condition, but the teachers were allowed to give the children born to them, four of whom were given a certificate to receive a certificate, who otherwise would not have received one.

An average of the markings on the four papers submitted by the school board, history and geography, were taken and an average made with the teachers' estimates. As a result 22 students were passed, nine were conditioned and eight failed.

At the recent school election John W. Ord was elected to fill the position of trustee for three years.
