

LAWYER PATRICK WHO IS MAKING LAST FIGHT FOR HIS LIFE.

The case of Albert T. Patrick, whose motion for a reargument was recently denied by the New York court of appeals, has been taken to the United States supreme court.

This decision apparently deprives Patrick of his last hope of interference, so far as the courts of New York state are concerned, with the execution of the death sentence, first passed upon him in March, 1902. The court of appeals within a few days will assign a new date for the execution of the original sentence.

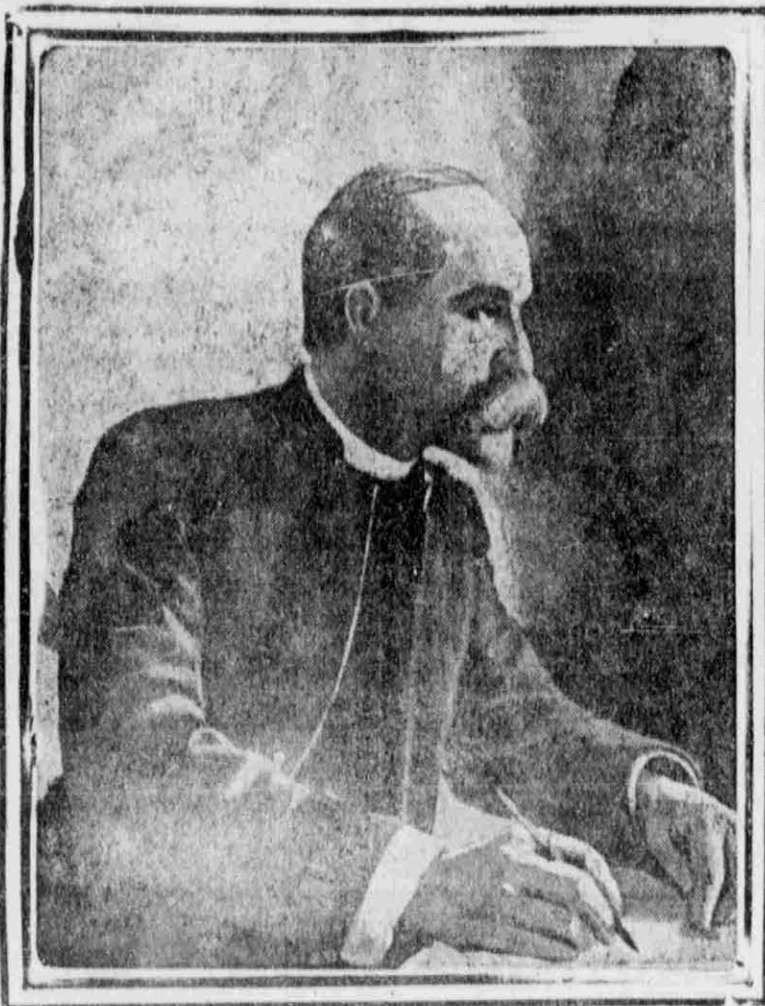
Whether the United States supreme court will accept jurisdiction by recognizing the presence in the case of any federal question, or, having accepted it, how its judgment will affect the final disposition of the convicted man, are questions upon which learned lawyers express widely different opinions.

Albert T. Patrick has been fighting for his life ever since March, 1902, when he was convicted of the murder of William M. Rice. He was convicted on the testimony of Charles F. Jones, Rice's valet, who made a "confession," the veracity of which has been impugned many times, that the murder had been committed by Patrick and admitting his own complicity. According to his story, chloroform had been placed over Mr. Rice's head.

Patrick was convicted after a long trial, in which James W. Osborne was prosecuting attorney. A motion for a new trial, made immediately after conviction, was denied, and Patrick went to Sing Sing, Jones, after being confined for a short time in the house of detention, went to the southwest, where reports were circulated that he was dead, but his death has never been established.

In the death house at Sing Sing Patrick worked hard on his own case, encouraged by the visits of his wife, who married him in the Tombs, and the report of the Medical Legal society that there was no evidence that Rice had been killed by chloroform.

When his case went before the court of appeals Patrick is said to have coached David B. Hill in the important points. The court of appeals affirmed the conviction last June, refusing a new trial and setting the date of execution for Aug. 7. Motion for re-argument and a stay of execution was granted July 24.



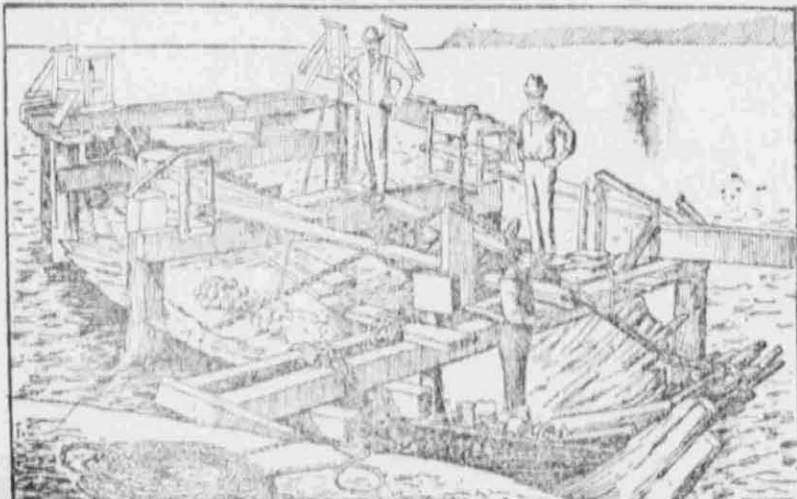
UNFROCKED PRIEST WHO CHANGED FAITH.

One of the greatest sensations of the year in church circles was created on Sunday, Nov. 5, when the Rev. Dr. Ingraham N. W. Irvine, the minister who was unfrocked by Bishop Talbot, of the Central Pennsylvania Diocese of the Protestant Episcopal church, was formally admitted to the Russian Orthodox Catholic church. Dr. Irvine was ordained a Russian priest by the Most Rev. Tikhon D. D. in St. Nicholas cathedral, New York.

In speaking of his change of faith, Dr. Irvine said: "I have weighed seriously the positions of the different portions of Christendom and have come to the conclusion that the Holy Eastern church affords a better basis for the reunion of Christendom than any other part of the Catholic church. In her midst I hope to be the loving friend of the Anglican church, as well as of the Roman and Protestant churches."

Dr. Irvine, who has been living in retirement in Philadelphia, is best remembered for the charges he recently brought against Bishop Talbot, when he charged that he had been unfrocked at the instigation of Mrs. Emma D. Elliott, of Huntington, Pa. The charges brought by Irvine were most sensational, and a board of inquiry was appointed to investigate. The board sustained Bishop Talbot.

RAISING A BRITISH WARSHIP FROM AN AMERICAN RIVER.



The cut illustrates the recent raising of a battleship sunk in the Thames river, near Lake St. Clair, Michigan, after the naval battle of Sept. 10, 1813, known as Perry's victory. When the shattered remains of the British fleet fled to Detroit, General Proctor ordered four ships loaded with munitions and supplies to go up the Thames. These ships were sunk and have remained at the river bottom until recently, when two of them have been raised, and the others are to follow. Quantities of muskets and cannon balls were found, but no cannon. It is thought that the Americans must have rescued the cannon at the time, although there is no record of such action.

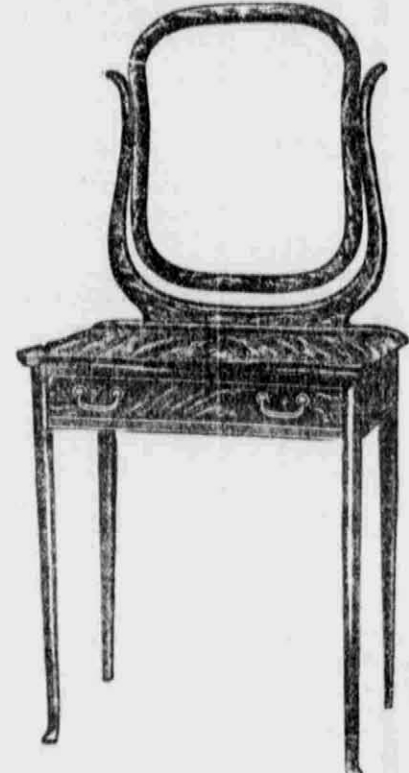
Music Rack.

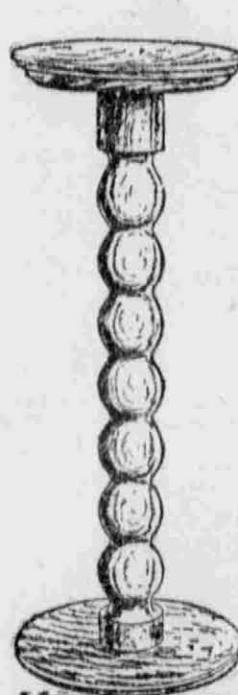

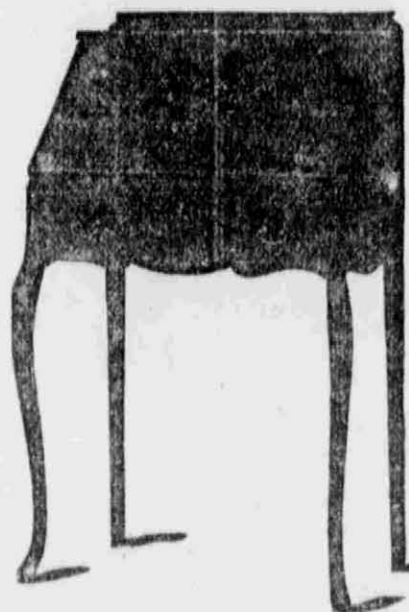
