**DROPPED DEAD.**

**YOUNG GUS LARSEN DROPS DOWN AND EXPIRES.**

About 12 o'clock to-day, as two or three persons were passing the north west corner of Brother Godfrey Lennhardt's lot, in the Eighteenth Ward, three blocks north of the new Chapel, they were shocked by discovering a lad lying upon the sidewalk, either already dead or in the last throes of the grim monster. Anyways, it not quite dead then he soon afterwards expired. The name of the lad is Gus Larsen, a resident of the upper portion of the 18th Ward. An acquaintance of the deceased states that he informed him that he faintly felt the result of using tobacco, he had quit the practice. We are also informed that about two weeks ago he was bitten in the brow by a poisonous spider and that death probably ensued from that cause, that being the opinion of a medical man called in to render aid that might be possible. When he dropped to the ground he was on his way home from work to his dinner.

**A Singular Incident.**—The other day a peculiar incident occurred in Denver likely to result in the death of a human being. Dan. Hogan was driving a switch engine of the Kansas Pacific Railroad near a vacant lot where some boys were playing base ball. A crowd of rowdy lads threw several volleys of stones into the cab of the engine. This so incensed Hogan that he leaped from the engine and rushed toward the crowd to punish them. They scampered in every direction, while Florence Smith, a colored boy of seventeen years, lay prone on the ground convulsed with hilarious laughter, incited by the scare. Hogan gave him several vigorous kicks, and although he protested his innocence, also give him some severe slaps. With the agility of a tiger, the lad seized a base ball bat, sprang to his feet and, as quick as thought, brought it down upon Hogan's head with such terrific force as to lay the skull bare by a long gash. Hogan fell to the ground insensible, and to all appearance dead, while Smith stood and looked at him in horror. The latter was seized by some people and kicked and beaten by them. The moment he was released he fled from the spot with the swiftness of a deer, and at last moments had not since been seen. Hogan was so badly hurt that he hopes were entertained of his recovery.

**An Erring Mortal.**—"He left a red herring." This momentous announcement appeared on the police office slate to-day. It was under the name of an aged individual who had shortly before been brought from the street heavily loaded. The external incumbrances consisted of the aforesaid red herring and a couple of cucumber pickles, and the interior cargo of an inordinate quantity of bad whiskey.
