That the defendant had reason to belleve he could not have a fair and impartial trial before this Court, on account of the great prejudice and bias of the people of Salt Lake County and the Third Judicial District;

That under the orders and rulings of this Court the jurors in this case were selected only from persons who testified that they believed polygamy to be Wrong:

That the jury box containing names of jurors to act at the present term of Court, was practically exhausted, and as a result the jury, according to the rulings and orders of this Court, would have to be made up from persons brought in on an open venire.

That the Salt Lake Daily Tribune, a paper widely circulated and very influential among non-"Mormons," by its inflammatory and abusive articles during the late trial, and abuse of jurors unwilling to agree upon a verdict convicting the defendant, since the conclusion of the trial, had aroused a bitter prejudice against the deduty to do so. With respect to the second count of the indictment, the court instructs you to find the defendant not guilty on that count. The court further charges you that a reasonable doubt is one based upon reason, and such doubt must be reasonable in view of all the fendant, who therefore had reason to believe that he could not have a fair and impartial trial in this court; and he accordingly moved for a change of venue to some other court in the Ter-

ritory.
