Manager Wootten spoke very eneduringingly of the showing of the Unit Connecty Light and Power plant, which last year produced a good profit after setting aside 7 per cent for renewal of machinery. If the cities interested in the Unit Connecty Light and Power company could buy out the individual owners, said Mr. Wootten, they would collect more mency as profit from the system than they now collect in city taxes.

Senator Smoot was asked whether the Prove Electric company, of which he is president, would sell its plant. He said he believed his company would sell; he brought out some points showing that the profits would not be so great as was expected by some of the people, at the same time wishing the project success if it should be gone into. He closed by saying that his company would sell, and it would not ask any profit, nor ask snything for the franchise.
