Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

Wool.

Boston, 28.—The wool market remains in the same comparatively
quiet state noticed for some weeks. Manufacturers are looking around
and are compelled to purchase more or less every week to keep
their machinery running. Medium grades of fleece and combing
and delaine selections are about the only descriptions that buyers purchase
with any spirit, and stocks are so light that buyers find it difficult to
supply their wants. Most of the desirable and straight lots of fine
fleece are held very firm, as there is a very confident feeling that all
will be wanted. Some lots have been picked over and from
which all that was really desirable has been selected, have been sold
at some concessions to close up inventories. California spring 20 @ 42
Cala. fall 20 @ 27; pulled in quiet, but desirable lots are scarce, the
price ranging from 40 @ 550 per lb.

Philadelphia, 28.—Wool is firm and there is an improving demand. Colorado washed 28 @ 25; extra and merino pulled 44 @ 47; Texas fine medium 28 @ 25, do. coarse 20 @ 25; California fine medium 25 @ 37, do. coarse 25 @ 30.

Decision Affecting Mining Companies.

WASHINGTON, 28.—The commissioner of the general land office, today, decided that the question of boundary, priority, & raised by the Equator Silver Mining Company against the application of the Marshall Mining Co., for a patent for the Reynolds Silver Lode, in Colorado Territory, must be settled by local authority before a patent can issue; both companies are of New York incorporation. It was incidentally decided that in the case of an incorporated company an adverse claim may be sworn to by an agent or officer of the company, but not incorporated it must be sworn to by the parties themselves.

The Safe Burglary Trial—Internal Revenue.

In the safe burglary case, to-day, settled with him for his services, making him sign a receipt for \$380, though he received only \$200; he signed in the name of Jacob Miller, a notary public, and greatly to the surprise of the grand jury, and offered to pay him \$100 a month to keep out of the way, when the witness left Washington. Subsequently he wanted witness to return, but learning from him that he intended to return and testify, Nettleship said, "For God's sake don't! He has some regard for my family even if he has none for me." He offered him \$1,500 to go to Europe and stay for a month, he accepted the offer, but he was not to be trusted. He had a ticket to Liverpool, and escorted him to the steamer; but he alid over the side of the ship and returned to New York, where he telegraphed to Down that he was ready to go to Washington. Before going on the vessel witness had gone to see Whitley, who was with Nettleship, and he told him that he had never seen Hayes or Nettleship in Washington, and he was not a witness with them. Witness told him he would not falsify, and would not go.

The Internal Revenue receipts this month will be about nine millions.

Decided.

New Orleans, 28.—The conservatives decline to accede to Kellogg's proposition to have two ballot boxes one to be set apart for the reception of the votes of citizens naturalized by the second district court.

A Conflict Probable.

Kellogg having decided that ballot boxes for the city shall contain a number of ballots for the voters of the second district court, and said naturalized citizens having, to-night, resolved to deposit their votes in the ballot box with other American citizens, a conflict on election day seems probable.

\$100,000 Fire.

Font's Warehouse, 28.—Taylor's grain warehouse was burned this morning with its contents; loss, \$100,000, insured.

\$20,000 Fire.

Pratt's Warehouse, 28.—Blair's iron and steel works were partially destroyed by fire to-night; loss about \$20,000.

Democratic Majority.

Baltimore, 28.—At the election, to-day, for members of the city council the democrats carried the city by a 10,000 majority.

A Town on Fire.

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., 28.—Green Castle, Indiana, is burning. The following dispatch was received here at 11:15 to-night: "Green Castle, Ind., 28.—The town is on fire, for God's sake send us help as fast as possible. W. D. Allen, mayor." One fire engine has been promptly dispatched by the Vandalia road. The telegraph office had to be abandoned as the fire is evidently working in the business part of the city. The wind is very high here.

A Witness Against the Carpet-baggers.

Montgomery, Ala., 28.—Chancellor McGraw, republican, whose division embraces nearly one-third of this State, says, in a published letter, "The chancery division over which I preside extends across the whole State, and I know as the White Counties, both in North and South Alabama. Since the beginning of the present political campaign I have held terms of the chancery court in various counties in eastern Alabama, from the foot of the Sand Mountain in northern Alabama to the Florida line in the south. I have been in constant communication as well as personal contact with all the members of the bar, and leading citizens of both political parties, all of whom counsel freely and fully as to the present state of political affairs. I have been present at gatherings of the masses of all colors, and have listened attentively to speeches on both sides, and I am prepared to say that I do not know of a single case of outrage or personal violence for opinion's sake in all the length and

breadth of this division, nor have I heard of even one substantiated case. I have no hesitancy in saying, that citizens of all colors and all political parties can and do freely and fully express their political opinions when and where they please, without the least fear of any outrage or personal violence. The outside world is deceived by the terrible passion into which letter writers and political editors have lashed themselves; there is not a county in East Alabama in which any man, democrat, conservative, republican or radical, may not publicly declare his sentiments with as little fear of molestation as in any State in all the broad Union."

Confession of Murder.

New York, 28.—Lewis Jarvis, today, confessed the murder of Jones, the Long Island farmer, as charged by Elbert Jackson, Jarvis' confederate.

\$75,000 Fire.

A fire this evening, in the buildings, Nos. 52, to 54, Columbus Street, Brooklyn, destroyed property to the amount of \$75,000. The losses are as follows: Adams, Hallock & Co., manufacturers of silver ware, \$45,000; P. O. & C. W. Fowler, owners of buildings, \$20,000, and the American Cork Cutting Co., \$10,000. Insured.

FOREIGN.

Great Britain.

Provisional Government Established.

LONDON, 28.—The foreign office is advised that Sir Hercules Robinson has established a provisional government in the Fiji Islands; the annual revenue from the islands is estimated at \$125,000.

Cable Cut.

A Monte Video telegram says the Argentine insurgents have cut the La Plata telegraph cable.

FRANCE.

Want to Raise a Loan.

PARIS, 28.—The municipal council will, to-morrow, take into consideration the proposal to raise a loan of one hundred millions of francs.

A Would-be Assassin Arrested.

The Italian Trabucchi, who was sentenced to death for an attempt on the life of Napoleon, and afterwards pardoned, has again been arrested, in this city, on a charge of threatening the life of Chevalier Nigra, the Italian minister.

Joined Don Carlos.

BATON Rouge, 28.—The French legitimist deputy, D. A. Teaple, has joined Don Carlos.

Fired on a French Merchant man—Denied.

MADRID, 28.—Advice from Santander report that a Spanish gunboat fired a volley of musketry at a French merchant vessel, and then fired a shot at the vessel to overhaul her.

It is denied that the government has any intention of summarily shooting the Carlist chief Lozano, recently captured at Cordova in disguise.

AUSTRIA.

Murderer to be Arrested.

VIENNA, 28.—The Turkish commission at Padgoria, in Albania, has ordered the arrest of a number of persons implicated in the recent murder of Montenegrins; reinforcements have been sent to the Turkish forces in Albania.

PRUSSIA.

Von Arnim Examined.

BERLIN, 28.—The preliminary examination of Count Von Arnim terminated yesterday, and the Count was released on 10,000 thalers bail. He will probably go to Nice for the benefit of his health.

Messrs. Blackman and Humbusch, the American delegates to the international congress at Berlin, have arrived in Berlin to study the German postal arrangements.

Will not be Allowed to Leave the Country.

Count Von Arnim will not be permitted to quit the country.

Contradicted—The Relief of Garibaldi.

The National Zeitung contradicted the report of the opening of negotiations between Germany and America, in connection with the treaty for the protection of the German colonies in Africa.

The National Zeitung says the German government has at present no reason to endeavor to come to any arrangement of the matter.

A meeting of the directors of several Italian newspapers was held to-day, to devise means for the relief of Garibaldi.
