

JOHNSON MEN WILL FIGHT BRYAN

St. Paul, May 8.—Chairman Day of the Democratic state committee, who is the private secretary of the governor, today ridiculed the threat of the Bryan men to hold a rival convention and send a contesting delegation to Denver. He said that the Bryan men have probably carried but six counties with a total of 59 delegates and that in no event will they have more than 100 of the 335 votes in the state convention. Chairman Day said: "The convention is ours. This talk of contests and a rival convention is simply bluff for the purpose of covering up a failure."

"The Bryan leaders spent \$20,000 in this state, and I know it, and now, with defeat staring them in the face, they are trying to make those who furnished them with the stuff believe that they were defrauded. I never saw such a campaign of defamation and debauchery of voters as was carried on by this same crowd."

"Why, they spent \$10,000 in Hennepin county alone. What they did is without record in the history of Minnesota politics. They told people that Johnson's defeat in Minnesota would end the whole thing and now that they have failed they are crying fraud. In half the counties of this state there was no fight. There was only one ticket and that was Johnson."

"We are going to Denver with a Johnson delegation and the Bryanites can do what they please. We will not recognize them in any event. If any of their number are in the convention and shown to be entitled to a seat they will get courteous treatment."

A conference of the Bryan leaders will be held Saturday. F. A. Pike, secretary of the Minnesota Bryan volunteers, said there would be contests from Polk and Waseo counties and probably from Hennepin and St. Louis counties. He added that a rival state convention was more than probable.

TOBACCO GROWER KILLS TWO NEIGHBORS

Frankfort, Ky., May 8.—The adjutant general's department was notified of an encounter between a prominent Madison county tobacco grower and a band of night riders which took place a few nights ago the details of which were rigidly suppressed.

Col. E. A. Tillard, commanding the troops patrolling this part of this state, obtained information that two negroes were shot and killed and one white man was badly wounded in an attack upon a tobacco growers plant bed. A half dozen masked men called upon the farmer who had refused to cut out the tobacco this year and per-

emptorily demanded that he destroy the young plant bed. Upon his refusal they opened fire upon him with a shotgun. Two negroes fell dead and an arm was shot off a white man who is said to be a prominent citizen of the community.

FERRIS FORMALLY CHARGED WITH MURDER

Butte, Mont., May 8.—Lewis Ferris, the young Italian who confessed to having dynamited the Burlington train on the Northern Pacific tracks near this city, a week ago, was today formally charged with the murder of engineer Charles Bussey, one of three victims of the wreck who lost their lives. Upon the filing of the information, Sheriff Chas. Henderson removed Ferris from

St. James' Hospital, where he has been receiving treatment for a bullet wound inflicted by Sergeant Stines when Ferris attempted to escape at the time of arrest, to the county jail.

IRISH COERCION ACT.

Bill to Replace it Passes Second Reading to the Commons.

London, May 8.—By a vote of 201 to 51 the bill repealing the Irish coercion act, passed its second reading in the house of commons today. Chief secretary for Ireland Birrell strongly supported the measure, declaring the coercion act to be unconstitutional and intolerable. He maintained that Ireland as a whole was law-abiding, although there was in
