When they are present in great num-bers, it is advisable to cut the grain for here they are at least a part of the bers, it is advisable to cut the grain for hay, thus saving at least a part of the value of the crop." Word also from Prof. D. A. Cockerell, consultin entomologist Arizona Experiment sta-tion, Los Veges, N. M.: "I have re-ceived your letter of May 5 with ac-companying bugs forwarded from Tuc-son, Ariz. These green bugs, injuring grain, are the 'western green stinkbug: they are common all over New Mexico and Arizona, but have not attracted general attention as pests until lately.
