CONGRESSIONAL.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 5.—Wilson offered

a resolution for an adjournment

from the 15th of December until

the 10th of January. Referred.

The question whether business

referring to internal improvements

should be considered by the com-

mittee on commerce or the com-

mittee on railways, after further

discussion, was referred to the com-

mittee on railways.

Townsend, of Illinois, from the

committee on patents, reported a

bill to repeal the existing statutes

for the renewal of patents, and de-

claring it unlawful hereafter for the

commissioner of patents to renew

or extend any patent for any de-

sign whatever. He stated the ob-

ject of the bill was to save the

from the statute book a law which

was dead and impertinent, the com-

missioner of patents not having

now the power to make renewals.

After some discussion the bill was

passed.

Resolutions allowing clerks to

EASTERN.

Petitions Presented.

WASHINGTON, 5.—During the

extra session of Congress there were

presented in the House of Repre-

sentatives no less than 1,603 peti-

tions, of which nearly 1,350 were

of a private nature, and were for an

increase of salaries of letter carriers,

40 related to currency, and 18 were

for the repeal of the bankrupt law.

Timber and Timber Lands.

The Commissioner of the General

Land Office is preparing a bill for

the reclamation of timber and

timber lands, in accordance with

the recommendations of the Secre-

tary of the Interior and himself, in

their annual reports, which will

provide for a systematic survey of

any of the various kinds of land

scrap heretofore provided for by law.

The bill will provide for the

sale of timber of certain kinds, re-

serving the soil with a view to a re-

newal of forests.

A New Democratic Journal.

WESTERN.

Excitement Over Gold, Quartz.

SAN FRANCISCO, 5.—A Victoria

dispatch says that British Columbia

is excited over gold quartz discov-

eries in the Cariboo district. The

lodes have been traced for five

miles, with a width of from eight-

teen to thirty-six feet. Assays

from fifty feet below the surface

give from \$40 to \$90 to the ton. An

FOREIGN.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Eastern War News.

LONDON, 5.—A dispatch received

at Constantinople, from Suleiman

Pasha, yesterday, confirms the

capture of Elena with eleven gun-

twenty ammunition wagons and

800 prisoners. The Russian loss is

estimated at 3,000, killed and wound-

ed.

Mahomet Ali telegraphs as fol-

lows, dated yesterday: "We have

advanced beyond Karmari. Our

line and confidence, the Russians

who have fallen back on Wretch-

eah."

A special from Adrianople says,

the victory at Elena removes all

danger of an attack of the Vain

Bahs past by the Russians, and

consequently enables ten Turkish

battalions, which have hitherto

been guarding it, to join Suleiman

Pasha's army.

The Russians now have 280 guns

in position before Erzerum.

A Belgrade correspondent says

Austria has sent a remonstrance

against Serbia's participation in

the war. No note has been re-

ceived from Turkey or England.

The final arrangements of the

Russians do not seem to be com-

plete.

A Bucharest dispatch states that

the Roumanian General, Lupu,

has been ordered to slacken his

advance from the Lom Palanka to

Widdin.
