NOTABLE UTAH WOMEN



The subject of this sketch was born in Farmington, Davis county, where she has continued to live for the last fifty years. Her parents, among other pioneers, came to Utah in 1847. In those early days the opportunities for an education were few, but Mrs. Clark, who has always enjoyed intellectual pursuits, availed herself of every chance to secure the best training that the times afforded, and at the age of sixteen began to teach school. She shared in the early struggles of the people, and became a mother of eleven children, eight of whom are living. To these children she has devoted the best energies of her life and her efforts in their behalf speak volumes in her praise. Six of the eight children qualified themselves for teachers at the State University, and all have shown marked intellectual traits. Conspicuous among these children are twin girls who, at the age of eighteen, graduated with honors this year from the Normal school of the University. Mrs. Clark early in life developed an interest in public affairs, and in Church and State has been prominent in every movement intended to develop the resources of the State and bring benefits to the people. While a young girl, she was secretary in the early organization of the Relief Society, and was the first president of the Young Ladles' Mutual Improvement association for seven years. For twenty years she has been vice president in the county primary work. She has worked assiduously in the interest of woman's suffrage, and she has been president of the county Woman's Suffrage association and vice president of the State suffrage association. During the World's Fale at Chicago, Mrs. Clark took a leading part in providing the exhibit of Davis county, which was foremost in the exhibits of this State. Since hibit of Davis county, which was foremost in the exhibits of this State. Since the admission of Utah to statehood, Mrs. Clark has been conspicuous in po-litical affairs, and in 1896 was nominated for the State Senate from Davis. Rich and Morgan counties. As the district was largely Democratic, she was not elected, but succeeded, however, in receiving the recognition of the officers at Washington, and was appointed postmistress at Farmington. She is at present vice president of the State Council of Women, and was sent at present vice president of the State Council of Women, and was sent as delegate to the National Suffrage convention at Washington in February of this year. During her visit to Washington she was invited to appear before the Senate committee in the interest of the women of the nation, and her remarks before the convention were printed in full. She is a charter member of the Utah Women's Press club, and has promoted its organization and interest by the exercise of her ability as a writer. At the Mothers' congress, held in Sait Lake City in February this year, she was appointed mothers' regent of Davis county.
