Douglas was sent up for life 10 years ago, for killing his wife while in a drunken fit. But since his incarceration has conducted himself like a model pris-oner, and is now the prison blacksmith with as much liberty as can be given a convict. Douglas is a member of the prison society of Christian Endeavor, and was for some time one of its offi-cers. His testimony in the society meetings has always been against drink, and he has often stated what whisky did for him. Douglas was of material assistance in squelching an outbreak in the prison several years ago, for which his sentence was re-duced to 25 years.
